WHEN TERROR STRUCK THE CZAR



THE smug aristocracy of Russia never felt so insecure as it did when, during the Russo-Japanese War of 1904-5, its own downtrodden people began to assert themselves. That war gave the signal for a revolutionary movement in Russia that struck terror to the heart of Czar Nicholas II, and compelled him to give his people the first semblance of constitutional government. That revolution of 1905 was almost successful. Mutiny, street fighting, mass meetings, and disturbances occurred in the larger cities and in the country. The timely promise of popular representation in government, and severe reprisals, stilled the turmoil.

In 1925, the Soviet government issued a set of three types of stamps commemorating this uprising. One of the stamps, as shown here, illustrated a typical scene—a revolutionist haranguing the populace.
