Rushing Rules

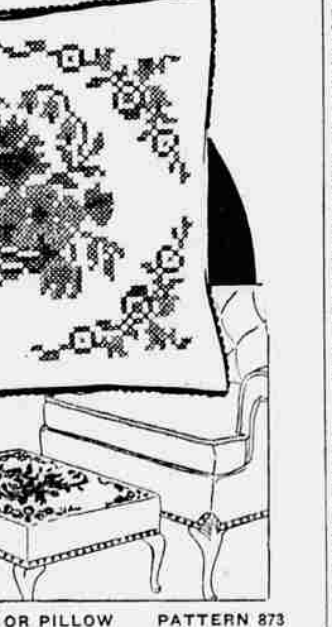
WITH the university year over, summer "rushing" will be soon underway by the sororities, alumnae and active members planning several events to honor prospective students.
