1 cup milk, 1 teaspoon butter; cook until thick. Fill a baked pie shell 2-3 full with the gooseberries and over this pour the custard and top with the stiffly beaten whites of 2 eggs sweetened with 2 level tablespoons sugar, ½ teaspoon vanilla. Bake in slow oven until brown. Whipped and sweetened cream may be used instead of the egg whites.—Mrs. E. L. Goodrich, 731 First street, Cottage Grove.
