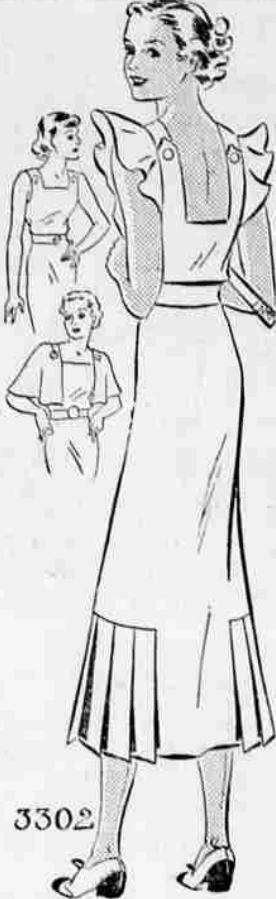
Funeral services will be held from the Veatch chapel Friday afternoon at 2 with Rev. E. V. Stivers officiating. Interment will be at Rest Haven.

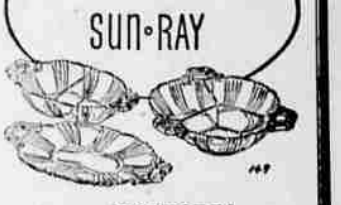
