Mr. and Mrs. Thomas of Portland were in Lowell Sunday looking after their property.

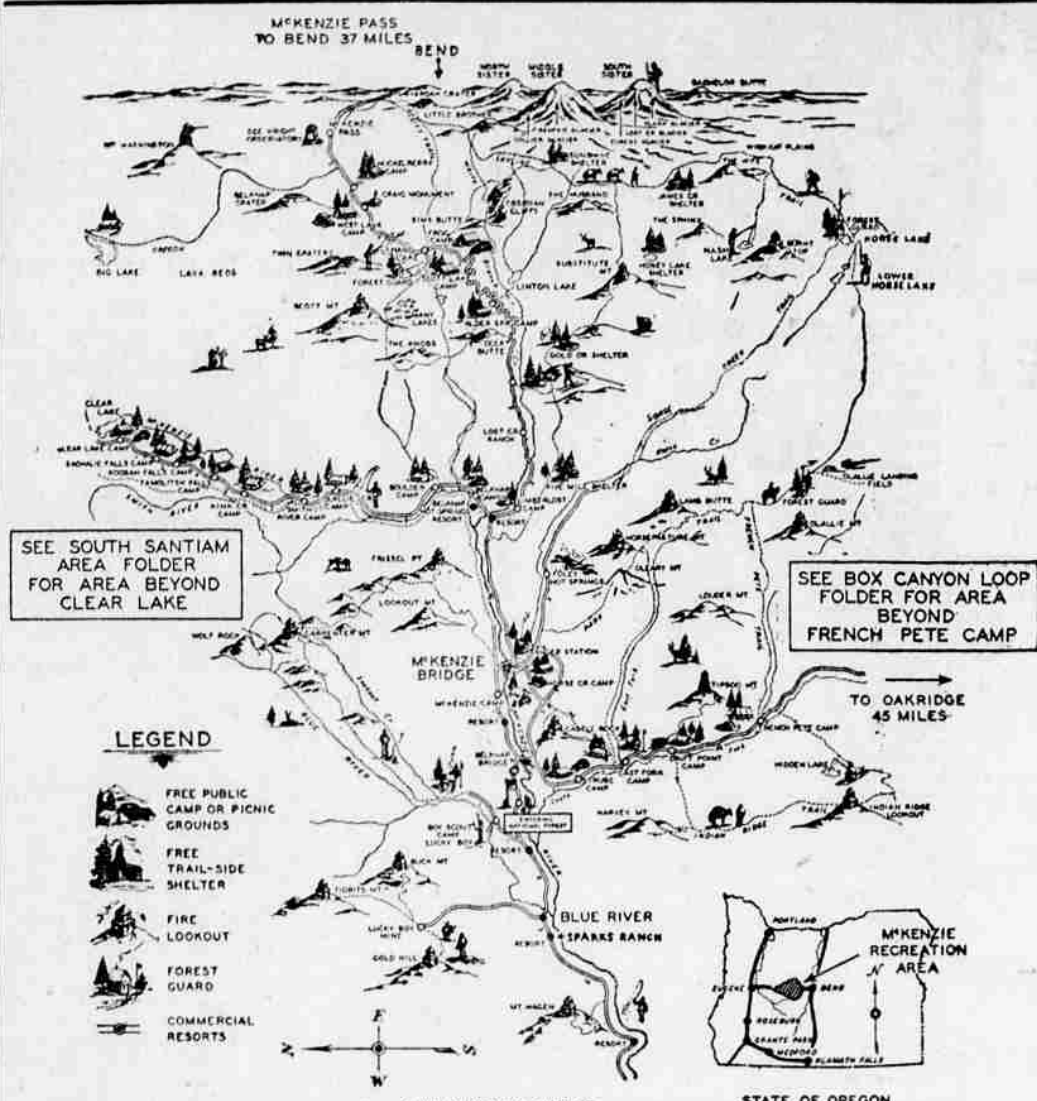
Julius P. Holt was a caller here last week on business. Mr. Holt formerly owned and run a sawmill here for several years.

RICKARD CLAN HAS ITS ANNUAL REUNION

Here is the picture story of the facilities for sports of all kinds in the great McKenzie river area of the Willamette National Forest as prepared by engineers of the forest service here who know every inch of the territory. A special folder containing this map has been printed by Shelton-Turnbull-Fuller and is being distributed in cooperation with Sparks Ranch at Blue River, Penland's grocery at McKenzie Bridge, the Carl R. Baker Film Shop, the Booth-Kelly Lumber Co., Carlson, Hatton & Hay, motor accessories; the Heilig theatre, the Ford-Nelson Mill Co., the Waldorf Paint Co., the Anchorage, the Midgley Planning Mill, the Eugene Laundry, the Oregon Hotel, Perlich's Food Market, and The Register-Guard. The folder contains information of camping sites, location of trails, lookouts, points of scenic interest and brief historical data on this picturesque country. A timely word on forest fire protection and fire prevention is a special feature of the booklet.

JUNCTION CITY, June 19.—(Special).—The eleventh annual reunion of the descendants of the Rickard family that crossed the plains from Indiana in 1853 was held at Benton-Lane park Sunday, June 10. This Rickard train, known in history as the "lost train," wandered for nine months before finding its way out of the desert into the "promised land."

Three brothers, Peter, Casper and John Rickard, and one sister, Sarah, and their families, were with this train and they all settled in Lane and Benton counties and took up land. They and their descendants have always been closely connected with the agricultural development of this section.

A program was given in the morning. An orchestra played a number of selections and several hymns were sung by the group. Chester Edwards offered a prayer. Darlene Rickard gave a reading and Gloria Brown a tap dance. Mrs. Lulu Foster-Christopherson gave an interesting history of the Rickard clan. Her niece, Patsy Lou Hackett, reviewed this interesting talk by asking questions to be answered by the children, the child answering the most questions receiving a prize. Maurice Tanner, granddaughter of Sarah Foster, won the prize. A piano solo was given by Ruth Starus. Readings by Maxine Walden and Marjorie Taylor, and a harmonica duet by Marjorie and Carol Taylor. The program ended by a song by the entire group and music by the orchestra.

After the program a feast was spread at which several hundred were seated. One hundred and eighty registered. Many failed to register and there were a number of visitors outside the clan.

In the afternoon a business session was held at which time plans were made for the 1936 reunion. Ralph McGee of Monroe was elected president; Ivan Rickard, Monroe, vice-president; Rena Edmonston, Springfield, secretary-treasurer; and Chester Edwards, chaplain.
