gressional leader who said privately the share-the-wealth taxes had not a chance in hell for passage this session.

"That's a separate jurisdiction," Doughton added. "Maybe they do have a chance on earth."

In a general endorsement of the President's suggestions, Doughton added:

"I subscribe neither to the idea 'soak-the-rich' nor 'crush the poor.' The president's plan wouldn't do that."

"I have no sympathy with those who advocate extreme tax plans. The way to stop those is not to go to the other extreme."

"Old Solomon—who was a pretty wise guy—summed it up when he said: 'Give me neither poverty nor riches; poverty lest I be poor and steal, riches lest I say, 'Lord who art thou!'"

test. Below is another collection of recipes from last week's event:

Current Cookies

1/2 c. shortening
1 c. sugar
2 eggs (I will do making the cookies less rich)
1 1/2 c. milk
2-3 c. "Fisher's Blend Flour"
1 t. baking powder
1/4 t. salt
1/4 t. nutmeg
Grated rind of 1 lemon
1/2 c. currants.
Cream the shortening and sugar. Add the bread crumbs and milk. Mix and sift dry ingredients. Add lemon rind and stir in, adding currants with last of flour. Roll out in squares, brush over with milk and bake in a hot oven—Marian Mettner, 1043 West Third St., Eugene.

Deep-Dish Huckleberry Pudding

1 quart huckleberries
1 c. sugar
2 T. flour
1/4 c. shortening
1/2 c. sugar (additional)
1 egg
1 1/2 c. flour (additional)
2 t. baking powder
1/4 t. salt
1/4 c. milk
Combine the 1 cup sugar, berries and two tablespoons flour.
Cream the shortening and gradually add the 1/2 cup sugar. Add the egg slightly beaten and mix until well blended. Sift the dry ingredients together, and add alternately with the milk to the first mixture. Arrange the berries in the bottom of an oiled pudding pan, and pour over the batter. Bake in a moderate oven (350 deg. F.) for 35 minutes or until batter is firm in center. Serve warm with lemon or hard sauce.—Mrs. M. Johnson, 501 W. Broadway, Eugene.

Current Tea Ring

2 cakes Fleischmann's yeast
1 c. milk, scalded and cooled
1 c. lukewarm water
1 T. sugar
7 c. sifted flour
6 T. shortening or butter
1/2 c. sugar
3 eggs
1/2 t. salt.
Method: Dissolve yeast and one tablespoon sugar in lukewarm water, add three cups of flour and beat until smooth.
Add shortening and sugar, thoroughly creamed and eggs beaten until light, the remainder of the flour gradually or enough to make a moderately soft dough and add the salt.
Turn on board, knead lightly.
Place in greased bowl, cover and set aside in a warm place to rise, for about two hours. Roll out in oblong

a piece one-fourth inch thick, brush with melted butter, sprinkle with brown sugar, currants and cinnamon. Roll up lengthwise and place in a circle on a large shallow greased pan or baking sheet.

With scissors cut three-fourth inch slices, almost through, turn each slice partly on its side pointing away from center.

This should give the effect of a many pointed star and show the different layers with the filling.

Cover and let rise one hour or until light and bake twenty-five minutes.

Just before putting in oven glaze with egg diluted with milk. Ice white hot with plain white icing.

MRS. WALEY RING LEADER IN GANG

do with the abduction case, that she had remained aloof from any participation in the crime except the spending of the ransom money, and that she had had no knowledge of the abduction until informed by her husband that the boy was hidden in the home at Spokane.

Confirming previous suspicions that a woman had written the notes signed by the "egoist," a single indictment naming only Mrs. Waley indicated that she might have written the notes demanding \$200,000 ransom and arranging for its payment.

Second Note Is Revealed

A second note was revealed in the grand jury proceedings which resulted in indictment of the Waleys and William Mahan, alias Grant, a fugitive, on charges of violating the Lindbergh anti-kidnaping law, of using the mails to defraud and of conspiracy to extort.

The contact note, not previously published, read:

"Time is up—get a room at the Ambassador hotel, 806 Union street, at 7 p. m., May 29.—Register as James Paul Jones, Seattle, Wash. You will be notified at the hotel where you are to go. Remember the demands in full. If the demands are lived up to in full George will be released in 24 hours."

Like the note delivered by special messenger to the Weyerhaeuser home on May 24, six hours after George was stolen, the contact note bore the signature of the "Egoist, Egoist." This note also was sent through the mails and through it the \$200,000 ransom was paid Mahan or Grant on the Pacific highway 10 miles south of Seattle and George was released early on the morning of June 1 near Issaquah, Wash.

discussion by individual members of the board indicated approval would be granted when the project can be considered in completed form. R. A. Babb and L. E. Simmons were named as a sub-committee to work with the sub-committee of the city planning commission to complete this project.

Estimates of the cost of moving the tracks and of straightening the river to eliminate the deep bend opposite the city will be necessary before official action can be taken, it was said.

Springfield Problem Is Discussed

The board requested the city of Springfield to make up a project on extending the city sewer line 500 feet over the present outlet in order to eliminate the present unsanitary condition. The board suggested the project be made an SERA plan, with the city furnishing the material. The sewer at present empties into a clog of the main river and during summer months becomes a virtual cesspool due to improper drainage.

Engineers who made a survey of the conditions recommended the pipe be extended 500 feet to allow it to empty into the main river. Members of the board pointed out the government was favorable to sanitation projects and declared action probably would be prompt.

Applications for SERA projects in preparing ownership maps of the Long Tom drainage project and the Mudly drainage district in the Coburg area have been approved by the county relief committee, it was reported by O. S. Fletcher, member of the board. These maps are necessary in making up the drainage projects.

Action on feasible projects can be speeded greatly if groups submitting them will have them in complete shape before presenting them to the board. Chairman J. O. Holt emphasized Thursday. This was the fourth meeting of the group.

SALEM, June 20.—The slimtest flax crop in a decade—hardly 10 per cent of normal—was forecast today by state flax plant officials. The phenomenally dry spring scorched the young flax and made it necessary to plow under much of the 2700 acres sown by the state.

SALEM, June 20.—Seining grounds near the mouth of the Columbia river should not be leased until salmon packing companies have paid back rentals, State Treasurer Holman said today. Columbia River Packers association and the Barbery Packing company of Astoria have asked for a lease on Oregon sands lying in Oregon water near Sand Island.

GENERAL WASHINGTON, June 20.—U.S. Attorney General James S. Cummings today promised to make a "sweeping" investigation of Ewing Y. Mitchell's charges against the department of commerce. "It will not be limited to what Mitchell saw fit to write, but it will be sweeping enough to reach a definite conclusion," the attorney general said.

BLTYHE, Cal., June 20.—(AP)—Little Betty Jo Lacey, newly arrived daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Lacey here, has six perfect fingers on each hand and six perfect toes on each foot.

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, June 20.—Officers today questioned John Doleman, 28, suspect in a fantastic plot to liberate Mrs. Margaret Waley, accused in the Weyerhaeuser kidnaping, and remove her to Mexico to escape prosecution. Doleman is suspected of being the man who suggested the plot to George Thulin, father of Mrs. Waley. Thulin was told a "gang" would free his daughter from federal officers at Tacoma, Wash., and take her to Mexico.

WASHINGTON, June 20.—U.S. A delegation of militant New York and Chicago housewives late today threatened the New Deal with an immediate and nationwide buying strike unless meat prices are lowered.

WASHINGTON, June 20.—Before congress had recovered from its surprise at President Roosevelt's call for share-the-wealth taxes, close confidants of the president passed the word today that he is considering a new and broad NRA designed to be, in a sense, a companion measure to the tax program. The revised NRA which the president is said to be considering was pictured as an effort to increase mass purchasing power.

and are of the firm belief that the most economical and practical facility for such relief is by obtaining and maintaining permanent water shipping schedules through the Port of Siuslaw at Florence, and

"Whereas, the district comprising the Port of Siuslaw together with the U. S. army engineers, at considerable expense to both, have already taken the initial steps in this program by the construction of jetties and certain channel improvements in the harbor which almost makes it possible for boats of small draft to enter the harbor with safety, and

"Whereas, the Berrie M. Haulon, a 450-ton wooden ship entered the port with partial cargo on April 29 and June 15, 1935, and sailed from the harbor with cargoes of fir lumber, finding the channel in fair condition with the exception of uneven depths in lower low water over the bar and a few protruding shoals in the channel, both conditions which could be corrected by dredging at small cost, and

"Whereas, since the citizens of central and western Lane county are determined to continue shipping through the port upon regular schedules there is a great need for the harbor to be placed in a safer condition,

"Now therefore, he is resolved, that we, as representatives of the leading development organizations of Lane county, do hereby petition and urge the board of army engineers for rivers and harbors to repair or improve the channel and entrance to the Port of Siuslaw in accordance with recommendations made by the district engineer in Portland, which report recommends that the channel over a depth of 13 feet and a width of 300 feet, and inside the entrance be dredged and maintained up to Florence to a depth of 12 feet and to a width of 200 feet, and from Florence to Cushman be dredged and maintained to a depth of 12 feet and to a width of 150 feet.

"Be it further resolved, that a copy of this resolution be sent to the board of army engineers for rivers and harbors at Washington, D. C., to the district engineer at Portland, to each member of the Oregon congressional delegation at Washington, D. C., and to the press."

majority of the employees shall, under the bill, bargain for all the workers in that plant and the employer shall be forbidden to bargain with others.

Q. Would the bill impose closed-shop agreements on all industry? A. It would legalize such agreements, but its sponsors say it would not impose them and that employer still would have the right to hire whom he pleased. Industrialists contend that in effect it would work for the closed shop.

Q. Would the labor relations board mediate labor disputes? A. Mediation and conciliation would continue to be handled by the Tye labor department. The board would confine itself to prevent the unfair practices defined in the bill and to supervision of elections for collective bargaining.

Q. Is the bill constitutional? A. It's sponsors say yes; industrialists and many lawyers say no.
