specialists in their fields. The session this year will open June 24 and end August 2, with a post session of four weeks starting August 5.

Visiting faculty members will include Eugene Gustav Steinboff, director of the national school of decorative art, Vienna; Dr. Donald M. Erb, associate professor of economics, Stanford University; Jasmine Britton, supervising librarian, Los Angeles schools, and others.

University faculty members who will be here for the session include Wayne L. Morse, dean of the school of law; P. A. Parsons, head of the department of sociology; Dr. H. R. Taylor, recently promoted to head of the psychology department; James D. Barnett, professor of political science; Dr. J. R. Jewell, dean of the school of education; and Dr. N. L. Rossing, and F. L.
