

SCHOOL BALLOTING RESULTS SENT IN

COTTAGE GROVE, June 20.—(Special).—The annual school election held Monday resulted in the election of Vinal Haddad, and W. L. Workman as directors for three-year term and C. E. Emphrey for two years. The budget was also discussed by taxpayers. The budget for 1935-36, which is \$305 less than for this year and \$282 less than could be raised under the 6 per cent tax limitation. Estimated receipts outside of tax funds from the district are \$19,200, leaving \$28,336 to be raised by district tax. No increase in salaries were granted. At a meeting of the school board Charles Beiler was re-elected chairman of the board and Worth Harvey re-elected clerk.

SHEDD, June 20.—(Special).—A board of directors meeting was held Tuesday night and Walter B. Davis was elected for the new director for three years, to take the place of Mr. McConnell; also Miss Lucille Shedd was elected secretary for one year. A bond was issued for \$2000 for the purpose of a new school building last week, and the school bill was voted on and passed 46 in favor and one against. The new board of directors will get together this week with an architect and make the plans. They hope to have it up to bid about the first of July. John Cox was authorized to buy new seats and the other equipment to be used.

YONGALIA, June 20.—(Special).—At the annual school election Monday afternoon, Roy Dodd was elected director and Mrs. Blanche Daugherty was re-elected clerk. Budget voting was delayed until a later meeting. Sixty-three votes were cast.

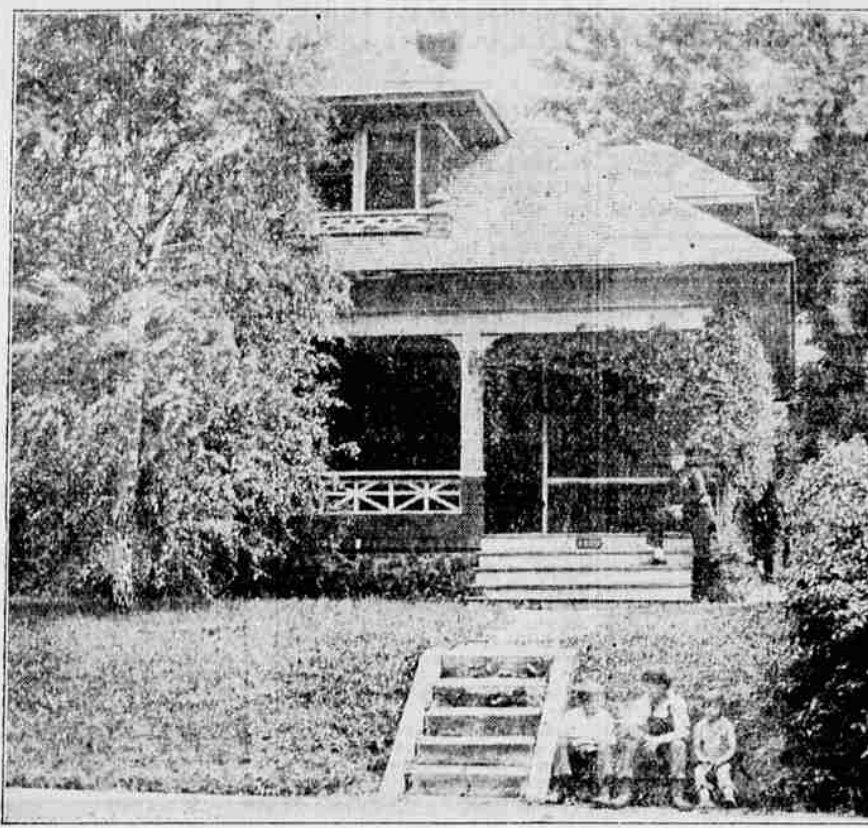

Weyerhaeuser family for payment of \$200,000 ransom. The Department of Justice revealed today. He secured daylight from the two windows in the gable seen in this picture. Neighbors saw members of the gang "coming and going" by the rear entrance during the week that George was a prisoner. When this picture was taken Spokane police were aiding G-Men in keeping hundreds of spectators away to preserve any clues the kidnapers may have left. The house is in a thickly populated residential district of Spokane's South Hill district.
