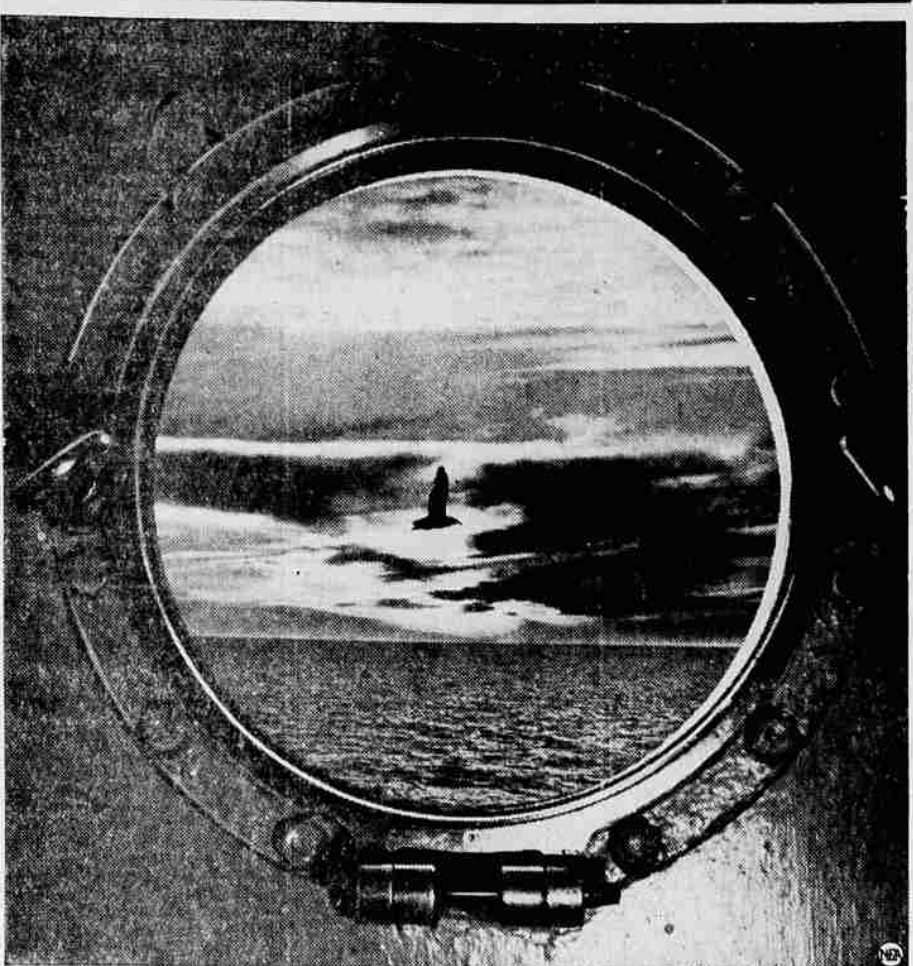
Several owners of bean yards in this locality are having their beans thrashed. Among them are the Harringtons and Siefert yards.

PORTLAND BUTTER PRICES REDUCED

PORTLAND, Ore., June 20.—(P)—Cutting of butter prices on the produce exchange for the late season was not a surprise for the reason that leaders of the trade have felt for some time that prevailing figures were a trifle too high and out of line with supply and demand.

Produce exchange differential between extras and standards was being maintained at 1 1/2c lb. despite the normal showing of 1 1/2 to 1c. This appeared due to the scarcity of top quality while there was an abundance of other scores. Price cuts in effect were 1c lb. for extras and standards and 1/2c for others.

Butterfat showed its normal cut along with butter.

Market for eggs was showing a generally steady tone and without price change for the day within the local territory. Prices appeared rather erratic at Seattle.

Local poultry prices were down again in spots with buyers generally inclined to force values to the extreme low and is quickly as possible. Plenty of orders to absorb broilers were reported.

While all last week there was a depressed tone for spring lambs in the country killed meat trade, a gradual cleanup of the burdensome surplus was reflected. There is now a call for fresh stock.

General cleaning up of country killed calf receipts was indicated here with maintenance of values reported. Hogs were fully steady. Beef was still drab in spots.

While there was again plenty of home grown peas for all needs here, many retailers were encouraging the bringing in of Seattle stock which keeps values here to a low mark.

Active trading tone was showing of hothouse tomatoes, sales were being made 10c to \$1.10 box of 10 lbs.

Fancy big cherries from The Dalles were meeting with favor here.

Arizona cantaloupes were moving well at full prices.

Strawberry market was steadier with raspberries and logans moving well.

Lettuce deal was steady with the best around 65-75c generally.

New Pasco potatoes were excellent and selling \$1.35 for 50s.

WOOL ACTIVE
BOSTON, June 20.—(U.P.)—Fleece wools are active, according to today's report of the U. S. agriculture department. Fine Ohio decline is bringing 30-41c in the grease. Strictly combing 50s, three-eighths blood, Ohio and similar fleeces are moving at 31-32c in the grease and some demand is being received on strictly combing 48s, 50s, quarter blood, at 30-31c. Country graded medium bring 3-8 and 1/4 blood combing and clothing fleeces offered at points in the middle west, are reported in Boston to be firm at 29-30c delivered.
