CITY PLAYGROUND ACTIVITIES WILL START ON MONDAY

Gilbert Sprague, director of playgrounds for the city, announced that the playgrounds and swimming pool will open Monday, June 24. A more extensive and complete program is being offered this year than it has been possible to present in the last few years.

Four playgrounds and the swimming pool are to be open and actively supervised. They will be located at Lincoln, Frances Willard, and Condon schools; the fourth will be in River-view Park in connection with the swimming pool behind Skinner's Butte. These playgrounds will be open from 1 p. m. until dark every day except Saturday when they will be open from 10 a. m. until 6 p. m.

Beside the regular playground handicraft classes special wood carving classes will be conducted. The junior high schools, one on the east side and the other on the west side of the city, will probably be used as centers for these wood carving classes. Additional activities will include classes in first aid, field trips, nature hikes, music and dramatic groups. A feature which will be especially appreciated by busy mothers is the children's nursery which will be maintained. Mothers will be able to bring their children to the nursery and leave them for a few hours under the care of an attendant.

The dates, details, and hours concerning the nursery and the special activity classes will be announced later.
