

# BUSINESS REPORT SHOWS PICKUP IN RETAIL TURNOVER

NEW YORK, June 21.—(AP)—Further indications of an advance in retail business were noted today in the weekly report of the National Bureau of Economic Research.

"Strengthened by the further widening of the distribution of manufacturing output, and the accomplishment of the major readjustments which constituted a disturbing factor in recent weeks, trade now reveals more indications of going forward," the survey declared.

"There has been a gradual breaking down of the summer slump, which is being bolstered by the abundance of money seeking investment, and the possibilities for gearings up industrial output to a higher level of operating expenditures indicated."

"Retail trade swung with more surety into its summer stride," it said, adding: "The most outstanding feature of the week was the broadening of consumer interest to the inclusion of items other than those falling within the narrow range of recent seasonal requirements."

Wholesale buying, the survey found, followed closely the inclining trend of retail sales, with the enlarged volume of specialties, vacation requisites, travel accessories, and summer apparel.

"The release of long-deferred orders for fall merchandise was the outstanding development of the week in many of the wholesale markets," the review said.

"Even though the seasonal decline has started to appear, to a moderate degree, in some manufacturing divisions, the general rate of industrial operations are at about the level established at the beginning of June."
