(Portland Butter Market Improves)

PORTLAND, Ore., June 22.—(A)—Butter market was showing a somewhat improved movement as a result of the late price local as well as at some other points along the coast and in the east.

There was practically no change in the local situation for the week-end. Both butter and butterfat were unchanged as a rule.

Retail firms were doing some shading and this may influence the wholesale costs within the immediate future.

Trade in the local egg market continued to reflect a steady tone with little change suggested through the country generally. Seattle report suggested a bad mixture of prices there with shading.

Rather quiet tone was showing for live poultry along the wholesale way although no further price changes were shown at the week-end. Only the small broilers were in reality quoted firm.

With great horde of supplies from Puget Sound, the local market for peas was too heavy with price cutting more or less general again. Quality in general was good.

There was a good demand for country killed hogs in the local trade with prices holding firm as a rule. Fresh lambs were also in better request and veal were steady. Beef alone was a trifle slow.

Temporary oversupply of string beans was causing general price shading here. This was due not only to the increasing stock of northwest growth but to holdings of stale Californian.

OPTIMISM IS DUE TO PROSPECTS OF BUSINESS ADVANCE

NEW YORK, June 22.—(A)—The stock market continued to push forward in today's brief session and many new highs for the year were recorded. Week-end realising in the first hour was overcome with little difficulty and bullish activity broadened later. The close was firm. Transfers approximated 787,000 shares.

Optimism apparently ruled in the boardrooms and profit taking was not current at any time. Strength was displayed by a few specialties, but the general gains ranged from fractions to around a point. Washington developments, on the whole, did not seem to disturb sentiment.

Market observers cited a variety of reasons for being more hopeful concerning the long-term aspects of securities. The pressure of idle funds for unemployment were cited as still one of the most important sustaining influences.

CHICAGO, June 22.—(A)—Bright skies and rising temperatures throughout the entire United States grab belt, with forecasts of continued like conditions, led to all around lower prices today.

A general selling movement got under way, and although sympathy with strength of securities caused some recovery, the rallies especially in wheat were not impressive. Use of combines in wheat harvest fields southwest was expected to be practicable early next week.

Wheat closed weak, 3-4 1/8 lower yesterday's finish, Sept. 30 3-8 1/2, corn unchanged to 3-4 lower, Sept. 75-75 1/8, oats 1-8 1/2 off, and provisions varying from 2 cents decline to 5 cents gain.

Much of the increase noted was on medium fleeces held in the country where prices were needed to have regained the level that took place after the business decline in late May. Strictly common 56s, 3-8 blood Ohio and similar fleeces advanced a cent in the grease in Boston to 31-32 cents. Other grades from fine to 14 blood were quoted from 26 to 30 cents in the grease with some sales going on at these prices. French combing 64s and finer territory wools in original bags sold moderately at mostly 65-67 cents scoured basis.
