UTAH MAN FACES DEATH AT HANDS OF FIRING SQUAD

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, June 22.——In a unanimous decision handed down today, the Utah board of pardons and paroles refused to intervene in the scheduled shooting of Delbert Green, 20-year-old convicted murderer of his wife, mother-in-law and uncle.

Green is under sentence to face a firing squad in the prison yard here at sunrise Wednesday, June 26. For five years Green has dodged death. He was convicted and sentenced to be shot in 1930, shortly after he shot and killed the three members of his family at their rural home near Farmington, Utah.

Execution was stayed twice by appeals to the state supreme court but in the last case appeal was denied and Green was sentenced for the third time.

In Utah, a condemned man has the choice of being shot or hanged. Green refused to make a decision in each case so the trial judge chose shooting for him.

Green has but one remote hope now of avoiding execution. It was possible, but hardly probable, for a district court to order a sanity hearing. If held insane at such a hearing he would be committed to the state hospital.

Gov. Henry H. Blood will not intercede as the governor is chairman of the board which decided he should be executed. The board has authority to order sanity hearings but, in addition to refusing Green's plea for commutation of sentence to life, refused to order a sanity hearing.
