

BUSINESS GAINS IN NATION SEEN BY TWO BUREAUS

WASHINGTON, June 22.—(Special)—

Business gains were reported today by the federal reserve board and the department of commerce.

The reserve board reported that the national income, the highest in five years, is the general level of industrial output in the first four months of this year was 7 per cent above a year ago.

The department of commerce said that retail sales generally have shown consistent gains during the past week. But few cities indicated a downward trend and these were in most cases caused by labor shortages.

No trade developments of importance resulted from the N. R. A. action, the commerce department said. "In a number of cities, including Memphis, New Orleans, Louisville, and Colorado Springs, the N. R. A. has been successful in obtaining cancellations from the old N. R. A. schedules were said to be gaining ground."

Consolidation in residential building and a 1 per cent rise in department store sales were reported by the federal reserve board. Bank deposits increased by more than a billion dollars since the start of the year. During the first four months of 1935, new billiard billiard exceeded one billion dollars, reaching the highest level in four years.
