

NEW LEGISLATION FOR NRA PLANNED AT THIS CONGRESS

WASHINGTON, June 24.—(AP)—New N. R. A. legislation, strongly backed by industry, labor, and the administration, will be asked of the present session of congress, according to authoritative plans revealed today to the United Press.

Although officials generally refused to discuss specific legislative plans to continue benefits derived from N. R. A. codes, authoritative sources described the method by which the three interests expect to collaborate on a more permanent recovery law.

The American Federation of Labor has near completion of a proposal to regulate all interstate commerce industries through a federal licensing commission. Business leaders in the commerce department advisory council are drafting a widely divergent proposal.

Present strategy will take both groups to the White House, probably next week, to lay their plans before the president. If a compromise proposal on which all can agree is not worked out in conference, the president likely will ask each group to work separately toward an agreement and report back at an early date.

Since new legislation is the common objective, participants on the plan believe a middle ground will be gained and that President Roosevelt will give his approval and send the suggested law to Capitol Hill, probably accompanied by a special message.

Leaders in the two groups believe a new law will be sent to congress within 15 days. "It can be passed within three days," one spokesman said. "With the president, industry and labor asking for it, it will be like getting money from home."

Organized labor is moving solidly to hold for workers the better hours, wages, and working conditions secured under the blue eagle. Prohibition of child labor is desired on all sides. Labor is not so concerned over collective bargaining guarantees, however, since section 7-A is incorporated in the Wagner labor disputes bill.

Industry, generally anxious to retain fair trade regulations which have benefited them, cannot meet labor's licensing proposal because of fear of too much government intervention.

One plan considered by the business group would have state laws regulate interstate business, while those in interstate commerce would be covered by a parent federal law. Another would combine N. R. A. with the trade commission and add three members familiar with code theories to the present four.

President's Tax Program Is Urged

WASHINGTON, June 24.—(AP)—Senator Robinson of Arkansas, the democratic leader, said today he felt President Roosevelt's tax recommendations should be disposed of at this session of congress, even though it meant a prolonged session.

"Robinson told newspaper men it 'would leave the country in a state of uncertainty' to have the tax proposals hang over until next session without action."

The democratic leader said he was expressing his own views and that they did not reflect the results of any conferences.

"It is my personal impression that the subject matter (of the president's message) should be treated separately from the pending tax resolution, but I'm disposed to take it up during the present session and dispose of it. The failure to do so would leave the country in a state of uncertainty. That means a prolongation of the session if it is done."

Nine cash prizes are being awarded. Below are some more of the chicken recipes from last week:

Chicken Salad
Cut cold boiled chicken in small dice, add 1/2 as much blanched celery cut fine, season with salt and pepper.

Mix with French dressing and set away for an hour or more. Just before serving stir in some mayonnaise slightly thinned with lemon juice or French dressing, arrange on lettuce leaves and cover with thick mayonnaise.

Grind enough cold chicken to make 1 cupful (left-over turkey may be used). 2 hard boiled eggs; 1 tablespoon pimento; 2 sweet pickles, all cut real fine.

Salt and pepper to taste; mix all ingredients together well and moisten with cream or thinned mayonnaise. Spread on white or whole wheat bread. This sandwich spread does not dry out quickly.—Mrs. A. E. Meyers, 391 Lawrence St., Eugene.

Tomato Surprise Salad
4 tomatoes
3-4 cup diced cucumber
1/2 cup diced cooked chicken
1/4 cup chopped walnuts
1/2 cup mayonnaise.

Lettuce
Select medium sized smooth tomatoes. Scald, peel and chill. Carefully scoop the inside out of the tomatoes. Remove the seed from the pulp. Chill all the ingredients and just before ready to serve, mix the chicken, cucumber, tomato pulp and nuts with the mayonnaise, add salt if needed. Fill the tomatoes. Arrange on lettuce leaves, and garnish each tomato with mayonnaise and halves of shelled walnuts.—Mrs. George Everingham, 1042 Polk street, Eugene.

PERKINS OUTLINES POLICIES ON LABOR

"To be quick to discover exposures" in mining, manufacturing and industry which may cause disease, and to devise and promote methods of prevention.

2. Transfer to the department of labor of the U. S. employees' compensation commission for administrative coordination and to bring the subject where it will profit by cooperative relationship with state workmen's compensation commissions and accident experience under the law will stimulate the department's prevention activities.

Cooperation Urged
3. Increasing cooperation between the federal and state governments in planning labor legislation to evolve uniformly a sound and universal labor-law policy.

Mrs. Perkins told congress the appropriations for her department had been inadequate "for increasing tasks" and the staff too small to accomplish all objectives of recovery from depression in which wage earners' losses had been enormous.

She added that operation of the National Recovery Act had led to important improvements in working conditions and the status of labor.

Describing improvement during the year in state labor legislation, the report cites several important new labor laws.

Among them are a Montana law limiting hours of labor in retail stores to eight per day and 48 per week; prohibition by New York of refunding under personal-service contracts on public works; an Iowa old-age pension law; acceptance of provisions of the federal law divesting prison-made goods of interstate character, by Mississippi, New Jersey, New York, Rhode Island, and West Virginia; limiting powers of state courts to grant injunctions in labor disputes, in Washington and Louisiana; revision of home-work laws in New York; protection of wages from garnishment in four states; and limitation by Louisiana of employers' power to establish age limits or hiring of workers over 50 years of age.

DUCE WANTS PACT

ROME, June 24.—(AP)—A high authority said tonight Premier Mussolini would suggest to Capt. Anthony Eden, Britain's traveling negotiator, who reaches Rome tomorrow, that his cherished four-power pact be pulled out of the discard and given another looking over.

The pact, initiated in June, 1933, but never ratified, would in effect bind Italy, Britain, France and Germany to collaborate in keeping Europe's peace for 10 years. It also involves economic matters.

SNAPSHOT HINTS FOR AMATEUR CONTESTANTS



Left: With modern cameras and films, night shots like this require only a minute or two of exposure—and a steady camera. Right: Striking pictures of statues can be made at night. Illumination by an auto's spotlight will suffice if regular floodlights are lacking.

To begin with, there's a lot of fascination in the idea of making pictures at night. Offhand, "pictures in the dark" sounds incredible. Actually, however, any snapshotter—no matter how recent a beginner—can make outdoor pictures at night easily, and it's a lot of fun.

Usually such pictures—of flood-lit buildings, of city skylines, etc.—have to be given "time" exposures. Since, for time exposures, the camera must be absolutely steady, a tripod or some form of camera support is required. If a tripod isn't at hand, the camera may be rested on any firm support—a bench, a rock, a box or even in the crook of a tree.

In making pictures at night it is more important than ever that you "compose" your picture before you open the shutter. Remember that any exposed light, such as a street lamp, an auto headlight or an electric sign, will register strongest on the film. Usually it is a good idea to avoid such lights entirely, unless they are essential to your picture.

"How long did you have to expose for that picture?" This is the inevitable question asked on seeing a night photograph. The answer is entirely dependent on the scene. With a "fast" lens and the new type super-sensitive film it is possible to make fraction-of-a-second shots of very brightly illuminated subjects, such as the crowd under a theater's brightly lit marquee. And you can hold your camera in your hand.
