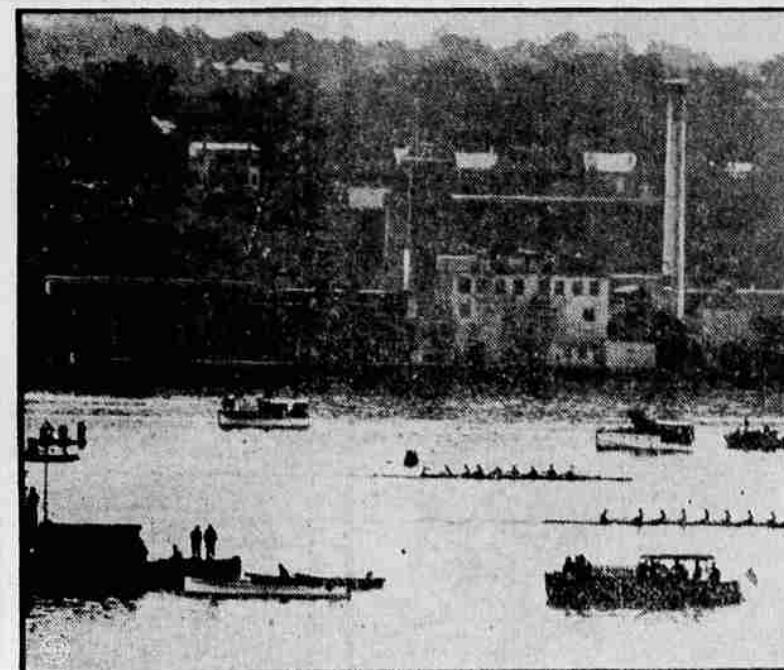
Mrs. Carrie Knight

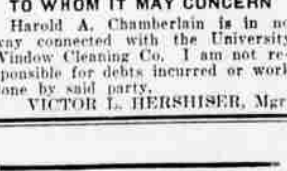
MRS. CHESHIRE IMPROVES
