Below is another collection of chicken recipes from last week:

Jellied Chicken

- 1 four-pound fowl
- 1 small onion
- 1 carrot
- 2 stalks celery
- 1 quart water
- 1 1/2 t. salt
- 1/4 t. pepper
- 2 t. granulated gelatin
- 1/2 t. grated lemon rind
- Boats, hard boiled eggs and parsley for garnishes.

Cut the fowl which may be an old one as for fricassee; cook it until very tender with the onion, carrot and celery and water, adding the salt and pepper at the end of the first hour's cooking. When the meat is very tender remove it from the fire, cool and cut into dice. Soften the gelatin in a tablespoon of cold water and then add it to two cups of the boiling liquor in which the chicken was cooked, stir until the gelatin is dissolved, add the lemon rind and three cups of the diced chicken. Turn into a mold which has been wet with cold water, set aside until firm, unmold and garnish with slices of hard boiled egg, parsley and tiny hearts cut from cooked beets.

- 1 c. cooked chicken cubed
- Lettuce cups
- 1 c. celery diced
- Ripe olives for garnish
- Mix chicken and celery with the following dressing:

Chicken Salad Dressing
1/4 c. vinegar
2 t. cornstarch
1/4 c. rich chicken stock
3 egg yolks slightly beaten
2 t. prepared mustard
1 t. salt
1/4 t. pepper
Few grains cayenne
1/4 c. thick cream
1-3 c. melted butter

Mix vinegar and cornstarch, then add chicken stock, eggs yolks and seasoning. Cook in double boiler, stirring constantly until mixture begins to thicken. Strain, add cream and butter; cool. —Mrs. Frances Plinsky, 1145 Lincoln St.

Creamed Chicken Sandwiches

Make a rich cream sauce and add 1 cup cold chicken to 1 1/2 cups sauce. Add a fine cut mince and 3 or 4 sliced olives. Make baking powder biscuits, rather large. Split white hot and fill with creamed chicken and serve with relishes and a vegetable. The same mixture may be used in patty shells. —Mrs. Ada Martin, Marcola.

proper cooperation from Washington and Juneau.

Houses or roads have not been completed. Wells have not been dug. Machinery and tools have not been delivered. The colonists said they believed some of the officials sent to Matanuska were "political" appointees.

One train comes from the coast each week. The colonists said, however, that there had been bungling.

F. D. TAX PROGRAM PUSHED TO FRONT; ACTION DEMANDS

running from about 60 per cent to about 80 per cent above \$10,000,000. The proposed corporation tax would run from 10 per cent on net profits of \$2,000,000 to 17 1/2 per cent on profits of \$20,000,000 or more. This sliding scale would replace the present flat tax of 13 3/4 on all corporations.

President Roosevelt's recommendations on the corporation tax were 10 3/4 and 16 3/4. Harrison explained that the 17 1/2 per cent amounted to about the proposal of the chief executive.

May Stick All Summer

Harrison, explaining the parliamentary procedure to newspapermen, said the house "unanimous" tax resolution would be left on the Senate calendar and not referred to the committee. If the committee approves the new program it will be offered on the floor as amendments.

"We are going to put these onto the joint resolution if a majority of the Senate votes that way, no matter how long it takes," Harrison said. "Every effort will be made to get it through before this week is over. But if we don't pass it this week, the government will lose from one and a half million to two million a day until it does pass."

Harrison said he did not believe the committee would hold public hearings on the program, but would get all available advice from the experts.
