plained "I heard a voice from the rear of the car say:

"Hey, mister, can I get out now?"

"I asked them who that was. They told me to mind my own business. I think that's the Weyerhaeuser boy," I told them, and again they told me to mind my own business.

"Harmon then asked Mahan why he had brought me along and Mahan replied:

"Well, she'll have to get broken in some time, won't she?"

In Spokane, Dore said Mrs. Waley told him she rented a house there had occupied previously, adding that "I never saw the boy and he never saw me."

"Had to Pass Ransom Bills"

The woman's story as revealed by her attorney is that when she and Waley went to Salt Lake City after the boy was released, "the day I got arrested (June 8) Harmon had given me a \$10 bill. I wanted to buy a birthday present for my father."

Having read a newspaper's list of the ransom bills, Dore said she added, she told her husband "this looks like a ransom bill," but that Waley assured her "don't worry, it isn't. If it was I wouldn't send you out to spend it. Lots of bills are numbered like that so don't worry about it."

She was arrested after spending ransom currency, department of justice agents charge.

The story as revealed by Dore followed the line Waley took when he was pleading to Judge E. E. Cushman in his wife's behalf during their arraignment in Tacoma. Dore said Waley will be called from McNeil island prison to free his wife by a confession, but that the defense will not call George Weyerhaeuser.

GRANTS PASS, June 26.—(AP)—Engineers went over plans for the junction of the proposed Gold Coast railroad from Port Orford with the Southern Pacific Skirron line at the town of Leland yesterday, and two alternate surveys were agreed upon. At Grants Pass, planned to be the Gold Coast's inland operating terminal, it was reported today that the surveys were acceptable to the Southern Pacific.

PORTLAND, June 26.—(AP)—Defering of the construction of proposed locks and dams to open the channels of the Columbia river above Umatilla, Ore., had been recommended today in a second report by Colonel Frank M. Robins, United States division engineer who believes benefits of the project at the present time would be not commensurate with the cost, which he estimated at \$70,000,000.

ALBANY, June 26.—(AP)—Everett Huddu, 55, giving his residence as Marshfield, suffered the loss of his right leg and right arm when he fell beneath a moving freight train here last night. His condition was reported fair today by hospital attendants.

PORTLAND, June 26.—(AP)—A short crop of raspberries in the Puget Sound area was declared today to be resulting in a mad scramble among canners for the local sector's crop. Up to 8-12 cents a pound was being reported being paid. The barreled market is said to be showing surprising strength.

OLYMPIA, June 26.—(AP)—A civil suit for \$312 damages against R. H. Hovey, Klamath Falls, driver of the auto which killed five-year-old Jessie Ann Polachek here Thursday, was filed in Thurston county superior court today by Charles P. Polachek, father of the girl. Polachek charged Hovey with exceeding the speed limit and with negligence.

NEW YORK, June 26.—(AP)—Wiley Post, one-eyed Oklahoma pilot, announced today that he will fly the north Pacific within three weeks to test a new plane and hunt tigers in Siberia. His wife and Fay Gillis, woman pilot, will go with him. The trip may extend into another around-the-world flight, Miss Gillis indicated.

WASHINGTON, June 24.—(AP)—The navy department today moved to begin immediate construction of the 24-ship program provided in the 1930 navy budget. Secretary Claude A. Swenson announced that sealed bids for construction of 15 warships which will be built in private yards will be opened at the navy department at noon on August 7.

NEW YORK, June 26.—(AP)—The Czechoslovakian film "Ecstasy" was declared "obscene and objectionable" today by a federal court jury, and barred from display in the United States. An appeal will be taken. The jury said the film was not fit for the eyes of Americans, despite a claim to artistry.

FAGNBOURGH, Hants, Eng., June 26.—Great Britain's new air sensation, the pilotless airplane, was demonstrated today over the Royal Air Force airbase—but a human pilot sat in the cockpit ready to grab the controls if anything went wrong. However, there was no need of this precaution, as the "Queen Bee"—as the type is called—responded perfectly to radio operation from the ground.

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PROGRESSIVES ASK SHOWDOWN ON F.D. TAX PROPOSAL BILL

WASHINGTON, June 26.—(AP)—Progressives in congress led a fight that forced democratic leaders today into a decision to appeal to President Roosevelt for immediate guidance on his tax-the-rich proposals.

Demands for an immediate showdown on tax proposals contained in the president's special message were made by a senate group headed by Sen. Robert M. La Follette, R. Wis., and in the house by Rep. George J. Schneider, P. Wis.

The whole tax situation was complicated by the demand of the so-called progressive bloc for action before adjournment, and a row between the house and senate over whether extension of "nuisance" taxes should be for one or two years.

The white house, in transmitting the message to congress, indicated that while the president desired early passage of his tax levies on the wealthy, he preferred to let congress decide when and how the measure would be taken up.

Neither house or senate leaders made any definite move to take up the far-reaching proposals until confronted today by a petition signed by 22 senators asking congress to stay in session until a program of increased taxes is enacted.

The demand jarred leaders into a decision to appeal to the president. Mr. Roosevelt is on a visit to Hyde Park, N. Y., and will not be back until Monday. Leaders decided to await direct word from him before going ahead with plans in either direction.

An administration source said that if Mr. Roosevelt declared in favor of immediate increases in inheritance, gift and corporation taxes his capitol machinery would be put in motion to ward that end.

Until the progressive move developed leaders had expected that the whole tax situation would be studied during the summer so that a definite schedule could be presented when congress convenes next winter.

"We believe," the petition initiated by La Follette stated, "that the tax program presented by the president to the congress should be disposed of before this session adjourns. We are willing to stay in session until action is taken upon this vitally important question."

A similar movement was brewing in the house, where Schneider said he would attempt to halt any effort to adjourn before the tax question is decided.

en). Roll pieces in flour and brown in hot fat same as fried chicken.

- 1 can Chili con Carne
- 1 mild onion minced very fine
- 3 T. melted butter.

Place chicken in baking dish and mix well con carne, onion and melted butter. Pour over chicken, bake in slow oven 30 minutes.—Mrs. C. D. Reynolds, Box 125, Wolf Creek.

Left-Over Chicken

When making the pie to serve with your chicken dinner make some extra pie crust and line some gem pan cups with it. Bake these and set away to use later. Cut most of the left-over chicken from the bones, then cut in small pieces or chop, and mix with a little left-over gravy. If you have no gravy, or not enough, add cream and thicken enough so that the mixture won't run. Reheat the crust lined gem pans and fill with the mixture, also hot. Set in oven a few minutes before serving. These are also good cold.

Roll the bones from which you have trimmed the meat until all meat which is left on them falls off. This makes a good broth in which to cook noodles. For the noodles beat two eggs slightly and add as much flour as you can possibly stir into them. Roll out into two thin sheets and dry for half an hour. Then flour the sheets well, make a roll of them and cut off in very thin slices with a sharp knife. Cook these until separated, then add to the broth—about 1 1/2 quarts, and cook in a covered kettle twenty minutes.—Mrs. Frank Sky, Creswell.

Chicken a la King

- 2 c. diced cold chicken (roasted or boiled chicken)
- 1 c. pimiento
- 1/2 green pepper
- 1 small onion
- 1/4 c. celery
- 1 small can mushrooms
- 2 c. rich white sauce.

White Sauce: 2 heaping T. of butter or chicken fat melted in top of double boiler. Add 3 T. flour and salt and pepper to taste. Mix well. Then add 3 cups of rich milk or part milk and part chicken broth. Let cook until thick and smooth. Not too thick though.

Chop celery, onion and pepper fine and put in pan with some butter to simmer but not brown. When tender add to white sauce with the pimiento and the chicken. Heat thoroughly and when ready to serve add the mushrooms. This may be served on toast or in patty shells. Good for luncheon or supper dish. Or one can make this ahead of time and take to a picnic and warmed over a camp fire.—Mrs. M. W. Heth, 1408 Eighth Ave. West, Eugene.

MURFIELD, Scotland, June 26.—(AP)—In an unprecedented wave of low scoring, Henry Cotton, the defending champion, shot a sub-par 68 today in the first round of the 72-hole British open golf championship to lead by one stroke at the quarter-way mark. Close on the titleholder's heels were the veteran MacDonald Smith of Glendale, Calif., and a left-handed swinger, Alfred Perry, who turned in 69s.

commerce and business, ways and means of employing additional personnel from unemployed young people.

"2. Train and retrain for industrial, technical and professional employment opportunities.

"3. Provide for continuing attendance at high school and college.

"4. Provide work relief upon projects designed to meet the needs of youth."

The president also directed that state youth divisions be set up. The state committees are to consist, like the national administration, of representatives of business, labor, agriculture, education and youth.

"Employees in all types of industries including agriculture, commerce, transportation, building and construction and utility services," Mr. Roosevelt said, "shall be asked to accept youths as apprentices under arrangements to be worked out with the state committee on apprentice training."

"Also wherever possible state, local and county clerks, city engineers, city department of business works and other activities of county, municipal and state governments, shall be asked to accept such youths as apprentices."

Mr. Roosevelt said job placements through cooperation of reemployment offices should be developed. He also asked for a census of the status of all youths between 16 and 25.
