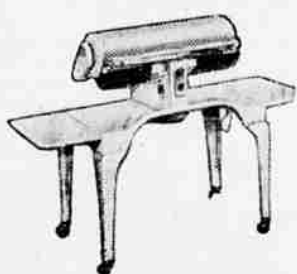

STORE FIRE CAUSES DAMAGE BY SMOKE

Considerable damage by smoke to the stock of the Army and Navy store, 716 Willamette, resulted last night from a fire of unknown origin that broke out in the basement shortly after 7 o'clock.

Joe Weinstein, proprietor of the store, is in Salem and no estimate of the smoke damage could be obtained last night.

Firemen cut through the floor to the basement to reach the blaze. There was nothing of value in the basement, it was reported.

The heavy smoke choked the store and poured out into Willamette street where a large evening crowd gathered.

Sparks still smoldered in the basement and a second call for the fire department was turned in about 9:40 p. m. The new fire was quickly extinguished.
