

BUSINESS PICKUP SHOWN IN RISING BANK CLEARINGS

NEW YORK, June 27.—(AP)—Bank clearings continue substantially higher than those of a year ago, Dun & Bradstreet reported today.

The total for the 22 leading cities in the United States for the week ended June 26 was \$4,967,480,000, against \$4,372,874,000 for the same week last year, an increase of 14.3 per cent. This contrasted with a gain of 5.7 per cent for the preceding week.

At New York City, clearings were \$3,402,125,000, an increase of 15.4 per cent over the amount reported last year, while the aggregate for centers outside of New York of \$1,565,355,000 was 12.2 per cent higher.

Chicago clearings were \$230,100,000 compared with \$213,900,000 in the same week a year ago.

Advertising during May registered a gain of 2.1 per cent over the same period a year ago, according to the general index of advertising compiled by Printers' Ink. The index figure for May stands at 81.2 as compared with 79.8 for April.

Corrected for seasonal and other variations, the compilation uses an index figure of 100 to represent the average of advertising activity during the five-year period, 1928-32.

gestion, \$1 in cash will be given, and for the next eight best, 50 cents each. Below are four more of the chicken recipes from last week's contest:

Rolls Chicken Sandwiches

These are especially dainty for wedding receptions and afternoon parties but hardly substantial enough for ordinary occasions. The bread must be of firm even texture and fresh. Wrap the loaves first in napkins wrung out of cold water, then in dry napkins and put in a cool place for several hours or over night. The knife must be very sharp, and it will be necessary to sharpen it on the file from time to time if many sandwiches are to be made. Have the butter softened. Put the chicken meat, which should have been boiled until very tender through the food chopper, using a fine knife. Mix to a paste with mayonnaise. Do not make it wet, just like butter only. Cut crust off loaf, top, bottom and sides. Cut sandwiches lengthwise. Lightly spread bread with the soft butter, then a thin layer of the chicken paste and holding the loaf firmly, cut the bread in a slice so thin that it curls as it is cut. The sandwiches may be rolled closely with a little care and should be laid close together so they will keep their shape. Wrap all in dampened napkin until ready to use.—Mrs. W. J. Green, 831 W. 11th Ave., Eugene.

Chicken Steaks

(Left-Over Chicken)

1/2 c. minced celery

1/4 c. minced green pepper

2 T. butter

2 c. minced cooked chicken

1 1/2 c. bread crumbs

1/2 t. salt

1/2 t. pepper

1/4 c. milk

1 egg

1-2 t. onion juice

Pan-fry the celery and green pepper slowly for five minutes in butter. Add the remaining ingredients beating the egg light. Form into individual steaks, dust lightly with flour and pan-fry until golden brown.—Irene Jody, 110 N. Mason, Eugene.

Baked Chicken Pie

3 c. cold cooked chicken diced

2 cold cooked carrots diced

1/2 cold cooked turnip diced

1 small onion.

Mix all ingredients together and cook until onion is done. Remove from fire. Arrange this mixture in middle of a deep pie dish, surround with carrots and turnip, some canned peas and button mushrooms.

If boiled chicken strain the broth through a cloth and with four ounces of butter and one-half cup of flour work into a sauce that is not too thick. Pour the same over the chicken and cover the dish with pie dough. Wash with milk and egg and bake in oven until nicely browned.—Grace Mend, 321 N. St., Springfield.

Chicken Croquettes

1/2 T. onion juice

1/2 T. chopped parsley

1 t. lemon juice

1/2 t. salt

Few grains pepper

2 1/2 c. chopped chicken

1 c. thick white sauce.

Mix seasonings with chicken; add thick white sauce until mixture will hold together. Form into small croquettes and set aside to cool. Beat one egg with 2 tablespoons milk. Roll croquettes in dry bread crumbs, then in egg mixture and then in dry bread crumbs, covering well. Fry in deep fat hot enough to brown a piece of bread in 40 seconds, 385 deg. F. Drain well on oiled paper and serve garnished with parsley on hot platter. Makes 14 croquettes.—Mrs. C. R. Parks, 2421 Kincaid St., Eugene.
