COTTAGE GROVE, June 27.—(Special)—The 50 men and three officers composing Battery "E" coast artillery unit arrived home from Fort Stevens on a special train at 11 o'clock Tuesday night. The company took part in the military parade in Portland Tuesday. The boys are considerably bronzed, in good spirits and report a wonderful time at camp.

Under the able leadership of Captain LaSelle Stewart the battery again carried off the high honors in the big gun target shooting, scoring 120 points, which is reported to be the highest score made by any national guard unit. Scores turned in by other different units were 21 points, 74, 95, 102. The range was 12,800 yards; at an average range of 11,850 yards. Battery "E" made five direct hits. The score is figured on the speed and accuracy of the contestant batteries. Twenty seconds is figured normal firing time, the Cottage Grove battery making it in 10.8. This with the accuracy of their firing gave them the high score.
