

STEIWER CHARGES WOOL SPECULATORS GYPPING GROWERS

WASHINGTON, June 28.—(AP)—The view that some dealers were speculating in wool at the expense of producers and government was expressed by Senator Steiwer (R., Ore.) today after the senate agriculture committee had authorized a favorable report on a resolution for a senatorial investigation of the production, transportation and selling of wool.

The resolution was introduced by Steiwer and Senator Adams (D., Colo.), as the result of widespread complaints from farmers and other wool producers in the west against the treatment they said they had received at the hands of wool dealers and brokers.

Steiwer explained the wool trade is centered at Boston and that dealers were permitted to handle their own wool, purchased outright, and also wool of producers and government agencies holding liens on shipments.

Steiwer said he had received dozens of complaints that dealers who have been designated approved consignees by the farm credit administration, were selling their own wool on favorable markets and holding the producers and government wool until they had disposed of their own holdings. The Oregon senator quoted one producer in his state as saying the present wool consignment plan was "the biggest steal ever perpetrated on any industry and apparently fully sanctioned by the government."

"We hope to obtain information on just how the producers and government are losing and what can be done to correct the situation if the senate approves our resolution," Steiwer said.

A thorough investigation, he added, probably will result in the introduction of legislation which would prohibit the dealer who speculates in buying and selling wool from handling any of the product on consignment from any source. The two branches of business are incompatible in the wool industry, he said, and a man should be forced either to deal exclusively in his own wool or exclusively handle wool on consignment. While not predicting such legislation would solve the sales problems of the wool industry, it "would remove the temptation for dealers to sell their own wool at the expense of the farmers and producers who have shipped to them on consignment."

Stories in STAMPS 'EL DIABLO' of ENGLAND

THWARTED, degraded, the butt of political intrigue, Thomas Lord Cochran, Earl of Dundonald, became one of the greatest heroes of Latin America. Chile, particularly, honors this great genius for his leadership of its naval campaign in its war of independence from Spanish rule. "El Diablo" the Peruvians called him because of his fiery courage. Especially was he "El Diablo" in his use of fire ships and rockets, a scheme of destruction he had picked up in his earlier experiences against the French fleet.

Cochran went to Chile's aid in 1818, when his own country had turned its back on him. From Chile he went to Peru, then to Brazil, and finally Greece put him in command of its navy. But in 1847, Queen Victoria restored him to naval rank and compensated him for the disgrace which he had suffered.

Chile first honored Lord Cochran with a stamp in its issue of 1910 commemorating its independence. The stamp shown here was issued in 1915.
