Haulers Must Have Long Log Permits

County Engineer P. M. Morse is calling attention to the law which requires log haulers to obtain a special permit for hauling logs over county roads and state highways if the combined length of the truck and logs is over a certain number of feet. As long as the total length of the truck and logs does not exceed 50 feet the P. U. C. license is all that is necessary, but if it is over that figure a special permit must be obtained from the county court if the hauling is on a county road and from the state highway commission if on a state highway.

PREACHER LEAVES HOLLYWOOD WITH BLAST FOR "SINS"

HOLLYWOOD, Calif., June 28.—(AP)—A scathing, 10,000-word indictment of motion pictures as "tools of the devil" was the parting shot of the Rev. Samuel Williams, youthful Bloomington, Ohio, Methodist minister, as he left for home today after failing to transform Clark Gable from a screen hero to an evangelist.

Mr. Williams spent three weeks trying to get in touch with Gable without any appreciable result. He went to Santa Catalina Island, where the movie star is on location, couldn't get near the company, returned here, delivered the 10,000-word letter to Gable's negro maid in Brentwood Heights, packed his bags and caught an east-bound train.

If Gable has any intention of deserting films for evangelism he hasn't made any public utterance to that end. But Mr. Williams thinks his letter will have the "desired effect."

He said so before he left. Nobody could reach Gable for comment.

Mr. Williams, who got around and saw things while he was here, said his observations had inspired him to write a booklet which he said he would call "Movie Madness." He said

he planned to publish it upon his return to Bloomington.

The letter he left behind for Gable fairly bristled with such high-sounding statements as this:

"You have been a tool of the devil, an idol used by the devil, one of the devil's pantheon of idols. The glorifying of sin has broken down barriers and led thousands of youths into forbidden paths. I dare say that screen idols grease the sliding board into perdition."

And this—
"I am reminded of your tourist camp scene with Claudette Colbert in the picture that gave you the rating as the best actor in 1934. That picture was an insult to the intelligence of high-minded persons. Only two weeks ago I learned of an alleged sequel to that picture from a probation officer in Oklahoma City, Okla. He told me of three youngsters he had to send to a reformatory after they carried out ideas which he thought they had received from that picture."
