

TRANS-PACIFIC'S
NEW AIR LINERS
TO BE LUXURIOUS

SAN FRANCISCO, June 28.—(AP)—The Trans-Pacific Air Lines, Inc., announced today that it had secured the schedule for its new trans-Pacific air service, for which the flying clipper has been paying the way for the last few weeks.

The new service will be available late in September or early in October, was made here by V. J. Cheney, general traffic manager for Trans-Pacific.

Cheney was on a 10-day inspection tour of the Pacific islands.

"That we figure on," he said, "is having the passenger in China on the first day."

Cheney said the exact time required for the flight across the Pacific had not been figured out as yet. From San Francisco to Manila would take 48 hours, he estimated, not counting the overnight stop at Wake Island.

The flying clipper, he revealed, will be used when regular passenger and express service starts "because it is too small." Instead, huge 44-passenger Martin clippers, now being constructed, will make the trip.

"The new ships," Cheney said, "will carry a load of about 2800 pounds each for 12 passengers, their baggage, some express and mail."

Tentative plans, he added, call for passenger rates about double now charged by steamship lines. On that basis, the fare to Manila would be slightly less than \$1,000 and to Honolulu, about \$265.

CATHOLIC WOMEN
MAY MAKE ISSUE
ON BIRTH CONTROL

SEATTLE, June 28.—(AP)—Supreme Regent Mary C. Duffy said today the Catholic Daughters of America, 200,000 strong, will challenge the National Federation of Women's clubs, who recently advocated dissemination of birth control through the mails and removal of laws against such information.

Miss Duffy was here in advance of the supreme convention of the order, which begins July 1.

"Many of the greatest problems of the nation will come before this convention," she said in an interview.

"Probably the convention will advocate elimination of radicalism and other subversive influences in the United States, urge definite action against persecution of Catholics in Mexico, and denounce the evils of permitting the spread of communism and bolshevism from that country into the United States."

"A constructive measure in contemplation will be a plan for fostering an international religious demonstration on a tremendous scale, along the lines of the recent plea of His Holiness Pope Pius XI for world peace."

"It is likely that these hundreds of delegates, representing 200,000 Catholic women, will condemn the vicious black-buckling system of motion picture producers, whereby exhibitors are compelled to purchase objectionable and indecent films against their own wishes."
