THE sale of the Portuguese clip per were beginning to flap listlessly under a slackening wind, and as commander, Pedro Alvarez Cabral, saw that he was entering the straits, he was on his way to India, by the same route Columbus had taken eight years earlier. Sailing that he might soon be captured, he steered a course more directly west. Suddenly, he struck a strange current that carried his vessel even faster than the weak west wind down the coast of South America.

Before he realized it, Pedro Cabral had struck land. By the instant turn of fate, this Portuguese explorer, who had been sent to the great Vasco de Gama to open a route to India, discovered that now is Brazil and took possession of the land in the name of the King of Portugal.

Although Martin Alonzo Pinzon, a Spaniard, had arrived at the Amazon a few months earlier, Cabral's discovery is considered the real beginning of the history of this country.

Brazil remembers this navigator on one of its stamps in a series which it issued in 1906, honoring the great men of its history.
