

STUDENTS INVITED TO JOIN OBSIDIAN MEMBERS IN TRIPS

July 12-14—Husband mountain, Elmer Wright and Walt Weber, leaders. This is rated as a "sporty" rock climb.

July 20-21—South Sister, Glen Sims and M. B. Castelleo, leaders. Members of this party will drive to Devil's Lake, on Sisters. A trip up Broken Top will be held this week-end under the leadership of Dot Dotson and Ned Vogel.

July 27-28—Mt. Washington, Ed Johnson and R. Wildman, leaders. This is the toughest peak of the Cascade range, the party being limited to 25 experienced climbers.

August 4-18—Annual summer camp at Mt. Jefferson.

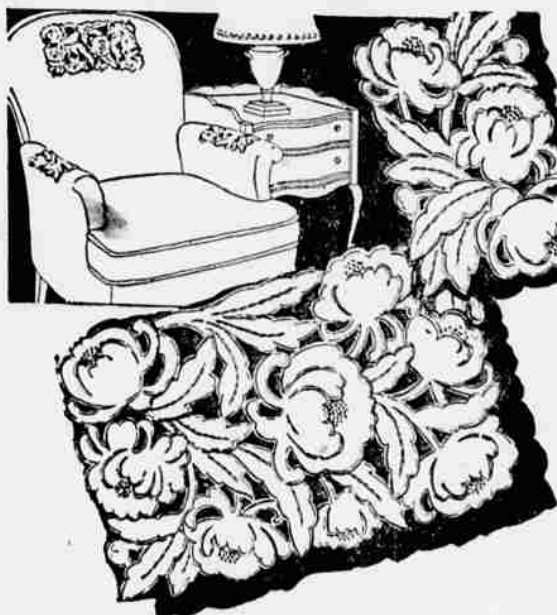
August 24-25—North Sister, Ray and Bob Lemon, Walt Weber and Bob Wilson, leaders. Limited to 25 experienced climbers.

Paris Politicians Duel; One Wounded; Making It "News"

PARIS, June 29.—(AP)—Pierre Godin, former president of the municipal council, was wounded in the right thigh today in a pistol duel with Jean Chappie, his successor in office. Intimate friends for many years, the sixty-year-old Godin and the 57-year-old Chappie exchanged four shots with dueling pistols today. They stood 25 paces apart in the garden of the beautiful mansion of Mme. Cotjarneau, widow of the late perfume millionaire Francois Coty whose name is known to women around the world.

Coldly, the parties bowed and the seconds arranged details. The distance was paced, and the signal for fire was given. Godin at the second shot slumped to his knees, a pistol ball in his thigh. In token of the bitter enmity that succeeded their one time friendship, Chappie, as Godin fell, walked to his motor car without the usual handshake—a notification to Godin that they remained unreconciled.
