

PROFESSOR GANOE SKETCHES GROWTH FROM DECLARATION

The natural rights philosophy which gave the idea of humanitarian government and the doctrine of revolution for use as a weapon when all legal redress fails, are the two most significant outgrowths of the Declaration of Independence made by the colonists, said John T. Gano, of the history department of the University of Oregon, in a talk on "The Declaration of Independence and Some of Its Implications" at the weekly meeting of the Rotary club at the Osburn hotel Tuesday.

The Declaration of Independence is fundamentally a revolutionary document, the speaker pointed out, and that the 13th and 20th centuries have unfortunately failed to remember this. "When the rights of man are so violated by the government of the United States and there is no constitutional or legal redress, I, for one, shall appeal to the revolutionary tradition of my fathers," Mr. Gano said. He also pointed out that the philosophy of "natural rights" has transcended the 18th century, in which it was formulated, and comes to the present day as the natural rights of humanity.

The speaker pointed out that the official act which declared the English colonies in American independent was not the Declaration which was passed on the Fourth of July, but was the result of a resolution to the Continental congress made by Richard Henry Lee that colonies "should be and are independent" which was passed on July 2. A committee of five was appointed to draw an official Declaration of Independence which was reported and adopted July 4.

Dr. J. F. Richmond gave a talk on flags prior to the Revolutionary war and illustrated the talk with flags of the period which he has made.

W. P. Fell, president for the past year, turned his office over to Dean Wane Morse, chosen as president for the coming year, at this meeting. A rising vote of thanks and an expression of thanks from Paul Green representing the board of directors, was given Mr. Fell.

Visiting Notarians included R. L. Patrick of Napa, Cal., J. F. Swigart of Grants Pass and Jack Sinner of Roseburg.

Visitors at the meeting were W. C. Yoran, who was secretary of the Rotary club here ten years ago and who is now living in Portland; Dr. Dale Moore of eastern Pennsylvania; son-in-law of Dr. George P. Winchell; F. H. Brundage of Portland, J. F. Reade of Denver, Howard Hobson of the University of Oregon, and Claude Brown of the law school at the university.

President Morse announced that the board of directors will meet Friday evening at his home to approve the committee appointments for the coming year.

Following are more recipes on new potatoes and beet dishes.

Creamed Ham and Potatoes

1 cup finely chopped cooked ham.
2 cups cooked new potatoes, cut in dice.
3 tablespoons butter.
3 tablespoons flour.
1½ cups milk.
1 tablespoon minced parsley.
1 tablespoon minced green pepper.
Salt and pepper to season.
Melt butter, add chopped pepper and parsley and cook slowly for 3 to 5 minutes. Stir in flour then add milk. Cook until thickened and smooth, then add ham, seasonings and cold potatoes. Cover and reheat over hot water or very slow fire for 5 to 10 minutes. Sprinkle with chopped parsley and serve very hot. Serves 5 or 6.

Snappy Potatoes

Dice enough potatoes, new or old to nearly fill a baking dish. These can stand covered with water until ready to bake then drain.

4 tablespoons shortening in bits dotted over top.

Salt and pepper.

A dash of Worcestershire.

Bake in oven at 375 degrees for 45 minutes. This makes a nice picnic supper dish.—Mrs. Albert Stewart, 216 E. Fourteenth, Eugene.

Beet Salad in Cups

Roll medium sized young beets with their skins on; peel them as soon as the beets are done. Cut a slice off the top and scoop out the center to form a cup. Chop or cut celery fine, cut cucumbers in dice, and use a portion of the diced beet. Mix and fill the beet cups. Put a T. mayonnaise on top. Place the cups on lettuce leaves, and serve ice cold.—Vivian Deardorff, 67 Washington street, Eugene.

The Boy Emperor Who Never Ruled



As tragic almost as the Romanov line itself was the short life of the boy emperor, Peter II, of Russia. Born in 1715, grandson of Peter the Great, the child from the beginning was kept in seclusion, apart from the royal family, and almost unknown to the people. He was the heir to the throne of the great Peter, but Catherine I, consort of the emperor, was made empress in his stead.

On her death in 1727, Peter became the center of a political storm before it was agreed that he should become ruler of Russia. Coming under the control of an unscrupulous politician, Peter was betrothed to Catherine, second daughter of this schemer, Alexis Dolgoruki, but the child fell ill with smallpox and, on the very day that had been fixed for the wedding, Jan. 30, 1729, he died.

In 1913, on the tercentenary of the founding of the Romanov dynasty, Russia issued a series of 17 stamps commemorative of its rulers. One of these, the four kopek, has the portrait of Peter II.

Workers Return To Weyerhaeuser, Long-Bell Plants

PORTLAND, Ore., July 2.—(AP)—Four hundred more men returned to their jobs in the Long-Bell and Weyerhaeuser lumber operations at Longview, Wash., today as the Pacific northwest strike slowly gave way to union agreements and non-union reopenings.

Nearly 1000 workers were on their jobs at Longview, about 50 per cent of the mills' normal crews.

The situation elsewhere was little changed.

In Seattle, sawmills and most wood working plants were still closed.
