

CATHOLIC WOMEN'S GROUP DENOUNCES "BIRTH CONTROL"

SEATTLE, July 5.—(AP)—A ringing denunciation of two other great women's organizations came from the Catholic Daughters of America today as they adopted a vigorously worded resolution condemning birth control advocates, as part of their Independence Day program.

The resolution was adopted at a business session at which the Declaration of Independence was read, in a convention hall room bedecked with flags and red, white and blue flowers. Later, the several hundred delegates heard a patriotic address by Lieut. Col. Abbott, of Seattle, on "The Drama of the Pacific."

Advocates of the dissemination of birth control information, the resolution said, are "un-American and unpatriotic, aiming at the depopulation of America and preparing the way for a childless America, to become the prey of the populous and prolific nations of the east." It also read:

"The Catholic Daughters of America, in national convention, denounce in no uncertain terms the pronouncement of the National Federation of Women's clubs, at Detroit, and the American Association of University women, at Los Angeles, as a direct insult to the rank and file of the decent and virtuous women of America."

The two organizations recently called for the legalization of the spreading of information about procuring and using artificial contraceptive devices.

Cushman Girl Weds Coast Guardsman

FLORENCE, July 5.—(Special)—News was received here this week of the marriage on Thursday of last week of Miss May V. Fosback, daughter of Mrs. O. K. Fosback, of the Cushman family, in Seattle to Loren Jack Olds, a coast guardsman, stationed at Cordova, Alaska. Attendants at the wedding were Miss Velma Helgeson of this city and Frank W. Crane of Seattle. The bride is one of this community's best known young ladies, born and reared on the lower Siuslaw. She graduated from the Siuslaw high school here with the class of 1931, and a year later was a graduate from the Decker business college in Portland. She has been employed in the offices of the Columbia River Packers Union at Astoria for the past 18 months. Mr. Olds' home is in Topeka, Kansas, but he is at present in service on the Coast Guard Cutter Haida in Alaskan waters.
