OLON GIVES ADVICE

ays Senate Liberals Would Support "Sensible" Party Plan

CHICAGO, July 6.—(AP)—Senator Nye (Rep., N. D.) appeared before a convocation of self-proclaimed radicals today, announced that a new third party "of old foundation" would have the support of Senate liberals.

Nye's appearance at the so-called "conference of farmer-laborites, progressives, California utopians and radicals brought intermittent cheering and heckling.

The radicals were awaiting a report of their platform committee on a resolution for a third party campaign in 1936 when he was introduced by Congressman Thomas R. Sullivan, Wisconsin progressive.

Called Second Party
"I am heartily in favor of this platform," Nye said, "and I am heartily in favor of a firm foundation for what some may call a third party."

He said: "In fact, however, it will be a second party, aligned against the old line conservatism of both the Democratic and Republican parties.

"There is room for a party founded on the interests of the great masses of American people."

A member of the audience asked whether the new party would have the support of Senate liberals such as Nye and Johnson.

Helen Wills Moody Wins Seventh Wimbledon Crown Saturday To Climax Big Comeback Campaign

WIMBLEDON, Eng., July 6.—(AP)—Dramatically rising to an occasion that called for all her old skill and power, 29-year-old Helen Wills Moody turned back the pages today, rallied from the shadow of defeat to whip her bitterest tennis rival, Helen Jacobs, and captured the All-England championship for the seventh time.

Apparently foredoomed to defeat when she trailed the American titleholder, 2-5 in the third set of a brilliantly contested battle that drew a gallery of 17,000 to Wimbledon's center court, Mrs. Moody came back in spectacular fashion to win the next five games in succession, take the set, and with it the match at 6-3, 3-6, 7-5.

For the San Francisco matron, it was a gallant and successful climax to a comeback campaign she started in England little more than a month ago after she had been on the sidelines for almost two years. It was vindication, too, for her disputed decision to default to Miss Jacobs in the third set of the American championship final of 1933 when she was beset by the back injury that subsequently forced her into temporary retirement.

For Miss Jacobs it was a bitter defeat just when she seemed on the verge of the greatest victory of her career. For the fourth time since 1929 she found herself beaten in the final round of the British tournament. She lost to Mrs. Moody in 1929 and 1932 and was beaten by Dorothy Round, British star, last year.

Most of the drama of today's battle was packed into the third set. Breaking through Mrs. Moody's service in the third, fifth and seventh games, Miss Jacobs rolled up a 5-2 lead and the finish, apparently, was in plain sight.

But Mrs. Moody broke her 29-year-old rival's delivery in the eighth game to pull up to 3-5 and then came the break that really proved decisive. On her own service, Mrs. Moody led at 40-30 but a double fault pulled Miss Jacobs to deuce. The American champion then had match point at 5-4 only to smash the ball into the top of the net on what looked like a simple kill.

That was all Mrs. Moody needed. She broke through Miss Jacobs' service at 4-2 in the tenth game to square the match at five-all and then held her own in the 11th to lead at 6-5. In a desperate situation, Miss Jacobs rallied fiercely in the 12th game taking a 30-love lead on a scizzling serve.

U. S. REFUSES TO ACT

Requests That Peace Pact Be Invoked Turned Down by Hull

ADDIS ABABA, July 6.—(AP)—The American legation today ordered all Americans to leave Ethiopia. Diplomatic circles took the action to mean that the United States expects there may be immediate developments between Ethiopia and Italy.

WASHINGTON, July 6.—(AP)—The United States is taking steps to evacuate all Americans from Abyssinia in view of the threatened war between that country and Italy, it was learned today.

Officials here said they did not know whether actual instructions had been issued to Americans to leave the country. But they said steps in that direction had been in preparation here and that the nationals of practically all other countries had been advised to leave.

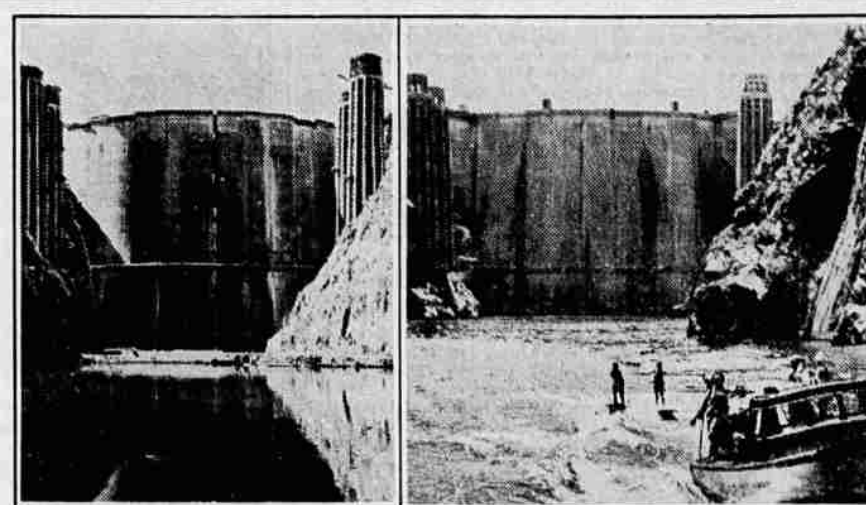
Final instructions would be left to American officials on the spot. Disclosure of evacuation arrangements followed the United States' refusal to invoke the Kellogg peace pact in an effort to avert threatened hostilities. Abyssinia had appealed for such action by this country.

There are about 125 Americans in Abyssinia, of whom 115 are missionaries and their families, according to the state department. The remainder comprise the legation staff and a few business representatives. Several of the Americans are negroes.

Officials said the Americans would not be actually ordered to leave, but that they would be advised to leave, which would have almost the same effect. The reason for starting evacuation promptly is that there is virtually only one method of egress from the country.

WELL, BOULDER LAKE! HOW YOU'VE GROWN!

Compare, in both pictures, the distance between the water's edge and the ledge crossing the dam's upstream face, which is 766 feet high.

HOUSE MAKES HUEY ABSOLUTE DICTATOR

BATON ROUGE, La., July 6.—(AP)—Disregarding charges that it was evading the sacred rights of local self-government in a state-wide grabfest, the Louisiana house today voted final passage of Huey P. Long's 26-point dictatorial program.

As the session got under way, state administration forces seated Albert T. Stumpf, Jefferson parish manufacturer, as a new member to succeed Representative Joe Fisher who was convicted and sentenced to prison for income tax evasion.

Action on the first bill, taking away the collection of taxes from the city tax collector and giving this duty to the state tax collector, brought forth brief but bitter opposition and demonstrated the futility of the anti-administration opposition.

Rep. J. M. Ferguson, Richland parish, explaining his vote for the bill, said he opposed in principle the theory of the state administration taking over functions of local self-government.

"I don't know whether Huey Long will manage the affairs of New Orleans any better than Walmesley but certainly he can do no worse," he said.

The bill authorizing the police and fire boards of New Orleans to borrow funds to pay policemen and firemen passed 88 to 4.

SCOUTS LEAVE FOR LUCKY BOY SUNDAY

Eighty-five Boy Scouts from the Willamette valley will Sunday go to Camp Lucky Boy high in the McKenzie country on the banks of the Blue river for the first two-weeks summer camp. COMPLETE SET-UP OF WPA IS LISTED

PORTLAND, July 6.—(AP)—E. J. Griffith, chief of the Oregon works progress administration, last night announced the selection of state assistants and at the same time confirmed reports that the new WPA set-up would materially lessen the burden of the Oregon relief administration.

All works projects now being supervised by the SERRA, headed by Elmer Goudy, with an estimated 18,000 persons, will be taken over as the first step in the function of the new WPA office, Griffith said. He also revealed that employables on the state's relief rolls would be transferred to the state headquarters of the national relief employment service from which men and women will be chosen for works progress jobs. Unemployables will remain the state's problem, the administrator said.

The Portland branch, Griffith declared, is to begin work on relief problems late this month. Other state branches will follow.

PORTLANDER RAZES CODES ON SATURDAY

Circuit Judge Winter Hands Down Opinion; Act Unconstitutional

APPEAL IS PLANNED

Supreme Court to Have Final Say; Local Growers Alarmed

PORTLAND, Ore., July 6.—(AP)—The Oregon Agricultural Adjustment Act, with all its codes and marketing agreements, was declared unconstitutional in an opinion handed down here today by Circuit Judge John P. Winter of Multnomah county.

Judge Winter ruled that "the law contains no standard limiting the authority of the majority who proposed the agreement regulating the price, work hardship here."

Local agriculturists were unanimous Saturday in voting the opinion that Lane county growers would suffer severely in case the AAA should suffer the same fate as the late NRA.

"Lower prices would hurt the growers," stated Will James, prominent local grower, "and farmers would have a difficult time securing prices as favorable as those now made possible by code provisions of the AAA." He said that growers of melons and tomatoes would suffer most.

The county agricultural agent's office agreed with James that prices would be hit, and added that the loss to growers of the bonuses received for restricted yields would be great at the same time increasing the produce on the market.

X-KING OF GREECE DIVORCED SATURDAY

BUCHAREST, July 6.—(AP)—On the day that he was crowned the former King of Greece, King George II, abandoned his marital domicile in Rumania, the court of appeals today granted an absolute divorce to Queen Elizabeth.

This action ended the possibility that Elizabeth might join the Greek throne should he be recalled as a result of a plebiscite to be held in Greece probably the end of this month.

The proceedings today occupied only minutes and were secret. George, who is living in London, ignored the divorce case and was not even represented by lawyers.

Elizabeth, it was announced, will resume her old title of Elizabeth Hohenzollern, Princess of Rumania. She will make her permanent home on beautiful estate she recently purchased in Transylvania.

Strike Violence Flares at Tacoma; Two Men Beaten

TACOMA, Wash., July 6.—(AP)—The intelligence division of the national guard today was investigating reported attacks late yesterday on two Tacamans, one a lumber mill worker, and the other a downtown department store manager, whom it is believed, was mistaken for a strike-breaker by five men who attacked him.

Three of the 14 major lumber mills operating during the week were closed for the week-end today.

Lytle Smith, 55, was in St. Joseph's hospital suffering possible internal injuries, the result of being attacked last night by three men as he was walking home from his day's labor at the St. Paul and Tacoma Lumber company.

The other man attacked was Louis T. Hubbs, department manager for Klopferstein's, Inc. He was in bed suffering cuts and bruises about the face and head.

GOVERNOR REFUSES PLEA FOR PARDONS

SALEM, July 6.—(AP)—Governor Martin today refused to interfere in the sentences of the three men sentenced to one year in the Multnomah county jail for assault and battery during the longshoremen's strike last summer, despite "pressure brought to bear by wealth and other powerful influences."

In a letter to the defense attorneys, the governor declared these three men, Thomas F. Black, Malcolm H. Samuelson and James Hanlon, had appealed to the governor after the supreme court had upheld their conviction asking him to set aside the decision of the highest court in our state "a court for whose opinions our citizens should have the greatest respect."

The executive pointed out the crime was committed last June and the defendants had not served one day of their sentence, and by the use of "various proceedings, the defendants still stand unpunished."

Three Docks Tied Up at Frisco For "Discrimination"

SAN FRANCISCO, July 6.—(AP)—The paralysis of industrial warfare spread to three more San Francisco bay docks today when union longshoremen tied up five McCormick Steamship co. freighters in a controversy arising from alleged discrimination against a ship's captain who marched in yesterday's "bloody Thursday" parade.

The controversy, shippers said, was precipitated when, under a company seniority policy, McCormick officials ordered Capt. Peter Long, master of the coastwise vessel Silverado, to take charge of the Charles L. Wheeler, formerly captained by Oscar Salo.

Salo, they said, refused to relinquish the ship which at the time was being unloaded of cargo brought in under Salo's command from the Pacific northwest.

The skipper charged he was being replaced punitively because he had marched in yesterday's union parade, commemorating death of two longshoremen in last year's wild July 5 marine strike riots. He charged discrimination.

\$15,000 Taxes Are Turned in Saturday

More than \$15,000 tax money, some of which was delinquent, was deposited with County Treasurer Grace Schiska when the weekly turnover was made by the tax department of the office of Sheriff C. A. Swarts, Saturday. In the turnover was \$5,493.54 on the 1935 roll, with \$4,685.18 interest on delinquent payments; \$2,364.92 on the 1934 roll with \$173.29 interest; \$4,694.08 on the 1932 roll with \$965.33 interest and \$1,861.95 on the 1931 roll with \$425.50 interest. The total amounted to \$15,961.29.

Assessment Roll Work Is Finished

Work of writing the assessment rolls has been completed at the office of B. F. Keener, county assessor, and the books will now go to the binders. Twelve women were employed in the office for more than two weeks to write the rolls. The assessor's force will now proceed with the summary of valuations of property in the county and the board of equalization will meet on the second Monday in August to hear complaints regarding assessments. The levies will be fixed in November and the work of extending the rolls will follow.

BANDITS PLAN TO ATTACK PEIPING

LONDON, July 6.—(AP)—The correspondent of the Exchange (British) Telegraph company at Peiping today reported that 2,000 bandits at Chang Tzu, Hsien, 25 miles north, had announced by pamphlets that they would attack and capture Peiping today or tomorrow.

Pine Business Has 34 Per Cent Rise

PORTLAND, Ore., July 6.—(AP)—New business totaling \$2,804,000 or 34 per cent above the 62-year weekly average for June and 22 per cent above the week before, was reported here today by the Western Pine association for the week ended June 29, based on the reports of 112 mills.

Shipments were 65,227,000 feet and production 72,254,000 feet. The same mills for the corresponding week a year ago showed orders 38,768,000 feet and production 56,544,000 feet. For the period January 1 to date of this year orders are 39 per cent above the same period a year ago.

Bus Driver Ruled "Captain of Ship"

PORTLAND, Ore., July 6.—(AP)—A bus driver, while on his job, has all the authority of a ship captain, including the right to order unruly passengers to leave the deck.
