PORTLAND BUTTER

MARKET IS STEADY

PORTLAND, July 6.—(P)—Steady market in butter prevailed and trading continued active, especially good demand showing for 90 and 91 score cubes, with supplies limited. Quotations were unchanged.

Jobbing quotations in eggs were unchanged with a definite tendency to market tone. Receipts were moderate in volume, but supplies were deemed adequate.

Live poultry receipts were moderate, with the exception of broilers, which came in liberally. Receivers have been rejecting an unusual number of arrivals due to poor quality.

Dressed poultry was offering a steady market, and jobbing quotations to retailers were unchanged. Trading was active and consisted mainly of replacements. Good call was reported in all classes, with preference shown for roasters and fryers.

Dealers were searching the local wholesale markets today for string beans, with few to be found. It appeared that shipments from The Dalles and Yakima were dribbling out, and the local crop was either not ready or unpecked. Almost any string beans can be disposed of in the markets today.

The fourth day of green corn arrivals in the local wholesale markets was marked by sufficient volume to furnish many retailers. Golden early market sweet corn was bringing a price of 5 cents an ear retail.

Wheat Prices Weak

On Chicago Market

CHICAGO, July 6.—(P)—Indications of a decided enlargement of domestic arrivals of newly harvested wheat from the southwest next week brought about increased weakness of Chicago wheat prices late today.

Sympathizing with wheat weakness, all deliveries of rye and oats sold at a new low price record for the season. At today's bottom figures, wheat showed a loss of more than 9 cents a bushel as compared with Monday's high.

NEW YORK, July 6.—(P)—The brief stock market session was so indecisive today that selective buying lifting several issues to new highs for the year while profit taking soft spots appeared elsewhere.

The close was somewhat irregular. Transfers approximated 600,000 shares.

Shares up fractionally to around a point included U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Republic Steel, Sears Roebuck, American Telephone, Loew's, Schenley, Air Reduction, General Motors, Chrysler, Western Union and Westinghouse.

While dividend payers continued to attract the attention of idle money hunting employment, buying surges in non-dividend issues were interpreted by some tickler type watchers as an indication that earnings hopes for various companies are growing brighter.
