inland nation, namely over a railway down to the sea. Italian occupation of Abyssinia probably would require use of that railway.

Officials here understood that eight missionaries left the country. The Italian occupation presumably will begin in a few weeks after the end of the rainy season.

WASHINGTON, July 6.—(AP)—The United States deposited the Italian-Ethiopian trouble back on the other side of the Atlantic today but said it was "worth to believe" either nation would resort to other than pacific means to settle the dispute.

A note which Secretary Hull sent to Emperor Haile Selassie in response to the Ethiopian monarch's plea that the United States invoke the Kellogg-Briand peace pact to prevent threatened war in Africa was interpreted widely today as an effort to avoid any entanglement in the dispute.

SALERNO, Italy, July 6.—(AP)—Premier Mussolini, mounted on a cannon, told 12,000 Blackshirts ready to depart for East Africa today that "we have decided upon a struggle in which we as a government and people will not turn back, he declared is irrevocable."

Earlier, enroute here from Rome, the wireless antenna of H. Duce's big seaplane had been struck by lightning but none of the occupants of the plane was injured. The wireless operator, signalling the occurrence, reported the plane had ploughed through a heavy storm all the way.

Today's speech was addressed to the volunteer Blackshirts of the "January 3" division who are expected to sail shortly for Africa. H. Duce told them the eyes of Italy were upon them and exhorted them to do their duty.

In their last three games the Seals have compiled the almost unbelievable total of 70 hits, more than some teams get in ten games, and have scored 28 runs, enough to win a dozen ball games.

In one inning yesterday the O'Doulmen crossed the plate 12 times in routing the fading Mission Reds for the third straight time. It was the season's high for runs scored per inning just as the total score, 24 to 6, was the new record for runs per game.

The attack lifted the O'Doulmen into second place and brought them within one-half game of the top when Ed Wells, Hollywood snaphaw, stopped the pace-setting Angels with six hits for a 9-2 victory.

AGRICULTURE ACT UNCONSTITUTIONAL JUDGE DECLARES

yond which the administrative body cannot go."

To Be Appealed

In declaring the state agricultural adjustment act unconstitutional, Judge Winter sustained a defense demurrer to the complaint in the action brought by the Oregon Ice Cream area committee seeking to enjoin Fred Meyer, Inc., from selling ice cream below the minimum code price of 40 cents a quart retail. This was the price established under the act.

Inasmuch as the future of the state agricultural codes and marketing agreements under the adjustment act depends on an ultimate, final decision, the case will be appealed to the Oregon supreme court without delay. Meanwhile it was agreed that the Fred Meyer company will abide by the code price pending the supreme court's decision.

11 Codes Affected

All marketing agreements promulgated and adopted under the agricultural adjustment act for Oregon will be nullified if the state supreme court sustains Judge Winter.

Among the agreements affected are those regulating the ice cream business, restaurants, bakers, butter makers, and tomato, cauliflower, nut, melon, prune and berry crops, and nursery operators and bulb growers.

The Oregon agricultural adjustment act was adopted at the special session of the 1935 legislature. It was amended by the 1935 legislature. The 1935 statute gave the governor authority to declare the emergency ended, but the 1935 amendment removed that privilege and the statute now runs by its own terms until June 15, 1937.

Mongolia Agents Demand of Japan

MOSCOW, July 6.—(AP)—Manchukuan authorities, with Japanese army support, have demanded the right to post agents in Mongolia to observe and dispatches from Ulan Bator (Urengai) today.

Three demands in all were presented, the dispatches said, and had the support of the chief of the Japanese army in Manchukuo.

Compliance in the government's view, would establish a virtual Japanese-Manchukuan espionage system in great Mongolia to the west of Manchukuo and bordering on the Soviet Union.

164 Fires Reported In Oregon Forests

PORTLAND, Ore., July 6.—(AP)—There were 164 fires, damaging \$74 acres of timber, in the 20 national forests of Oregon and Washington during the spring fire season which closed July 1, Regional Forester C. J. Buck reported Friday.

In the spring period last year, 271 fires were recorded, burning over 2024 acres. Buck said about 80 per cent of the fires were caused by carelessness. Sixty conflagrations were attributed to smokers.

"Watermelon Sherbet"

Cut a ripe watermelon apart; take out the pink part, rejecting the seeds and with a silver knife cut the pulp into small pieces. Put this into a packed ice cream freezer. Squeeze the juice from one large lemon and make the juice into a thick syrup by stirring powdered sugar into it. Turn the juice into the freezer and stir with the melon. Cover the freezer and let the melon remain twenty minutes, turning the beater around every three or four minutes, so that the pulp will freeze evenly. It should be like snow, not a solid mass. Serve in sherbet glasses for a dessert on a hot day.—Mrs. F. M. Peebles, Goshen.

Cantaloupe Salad

1 cantaloupe
3 dozen sweet red or black cherries
1 head of lettuce
1/2 cup French or Vinaigrette dressing.

Chill cantaloupe thoroughly. Cut in six sections. Remove seeds and peel. Arrange in one layer of lettuce with 6 pitted cherries. Keep cold until ready to serve. Serve at the table with dressing. Serves six. (Cantaloupe also combines well with grapefruit).—Mrs. F. G. Weinick, 765 East 17th St.

A Utah girl lifted from obscurity to national notoriety by the criminal exploits of her husband, Harmon Metz Waley, small time crook, Mrs. Waley obviously dreaded resumption of her trial next Tuesday morning.

The only hope it held out to her was that sometime during the criminal proceedings against her she will see her husband for the first time since he was taken two weeks ago to McNeil Island federal penitentiary to begin a 45-year sentence.

LONDON, July 6.—(AP)—Loretta Young saw Wimbledon's last day of tennis today with Fred Perry, England's tennis star, but denied persistent rumors they intend to marry.

"There isn't any love for me now," said the screen star. "I am very fond of Frederick, but all those things that have been said about us are untrue."

"I saw him only about three times before he went to Australia and only once when he returned to California. I admire Frederick as a champion, not as a prospective husband."

She and her mother were guests of Perry at Wimbledon, who yesterday won the singles title by defeating Baron Von Cramm of Germany. The actress denied she was responsible for the break-up of the engagement of Perry to Mary Lawson, British actress.

Left Wing Leader Leaves For Meet

SAN FRANCISCO, July 6.—(AP)—Harry Bridges, left wing leader in the International Longshoremen's association, prepared today to carry his doctrines of a "united front" and a militant labor force eastward to the international conventions of his organization.

Bridges' departure for New York was expected to ease for a time the Pacific Coast situation in which repeated strikes and other alleged violations of a capital-labor working agreement have produced unrest, employers' ultimatums and possibilities of a general maritime strike.

At the convention Bridges and the left wing group supporting him will attempt to wrest control of the organization from Joseph P. Ryan, conservative president. The San Francisco longshoreman also intends to preach his doctrines to Eastern seabornd workers.

Roosevelt Leaves On Fishing Jaunt

WASHINGTON, July 6.—(AP)—President Roosevelt left the White House by motor boat today for Annapolis, Md., to board the government yacht Sequoia for a week-end cruise on Chesapeake bay.

Invited to accompany him on the cruise were Senator and Mrs. Hiram Johnson of California and R. Walton Moore, assistant secretary of state.

The president hoped for some fishing during the afternoon and planned to spend all day tomorrow on the Chesapeake. He will return to the White House tomorrow night.
