National A.A.U.W. Convention Reported

GLOWING accounts of the national convention of the American Association of University Women held June 24 to 28 at Los Angeles were brought back to Eugene by Mrs. Virgil Earl, state president of the A. A. U. W. for Oregon, and Mrs. Nelson Macchaff, president of the Eugene branch of the A. A. U. W. who returned last week from attending the convention.

The convention headquarters were at the Ambassador hotel and delegates from ten of the fourteen Oregon branches were present. Seven hundred and fifty voting delegates were in attendance and other 1200 people registered for the convention.

The topic of the session was "University Women as Makers of Social History" and two days of the convention were devoted to topics of economics and consumer interest. One day was devoted to the discussion of "Education for National Understanding and Reconstruction in the United States" and "Education for International Understanding and Reconstruction in the Independent World."

Neta Glass, president of the University of California, was the guest speaker and sister of Senator Carter Glass, president at the convention. She is the national president of the association.

Two teas of note were held for the visitors at the Women's University club of Los Angeles and at the Edith club. Two dinners were also outstanding according to Mrs. Earl, one being a "California" dinner at which Dr. Aurelia Reinhardt, president of Mills college, presided, where a pageant "Under Six Flags" written by Miss Marion Cox was presented and the other being a radio and motion picture dinner at which the executive secretary of the Theater Guild and Miss Evelyn Venable, screen star, spoke.
