

THOMAS SAYS F. D. TO BE ASKED FOR STABILIZATION

WASHINGTON, July 6.—(P)—The 40 senators, including members from all but about a dozen states, appended their names to a letter addressed by Thomas to the president requesting adherence to the monetary policy adopted by the government. Under terms of that policy, the government was pledged to continue buying silver until either one-half of the nation's monetary metal was silver or until the price of silver had reached \$1.29 an ounce.

Commenting on the recent drop in the price of silver from a high of 80 cents to about 60 cents, Thomas said the banks, with foreknowledge of when the treasury was to buy or sell silver, were able to profit either on the upturn or the down.

The Oklahoma emphasized he did not accuse either Secretary Morgenthau or the banks with "duplicitous" or "dishonest" behavior, but an opportunity for profit is offered.

Thomas said if purchasing increased the \$1.29 price would be reached before the United States had reached its prescribed quota of \$5,000,000,000 of monetary metal.

1936 HUSKIES FACE SUICIDE SCHEDULE

SEATTLE, July 6.—(P)—With final arrangements made today for a home-and-home football series with the University of Minnesota, Coach Jimmy Phelan and his University of Washington grid warriors face an almost impossible schedule in 1936.

Charles Frankland, director of athletics at Washington, announced the Minnesota series today, the first game to be played in Seattle, Sept. 26, 1936, and the return battle to be waged in Minneapolis a year or two later.

The 1936 contest will give Washington its toughest but finest home season in history, as the Huskies are expected to also clash with Washington State college, California and Southern California on its home grounds the same year.

Two other conference games will be scheduled with either Idaho, Oregon State or Montana, the same season.

And to climax this terrific program, Washington will journey to Hawaii in December of 1936 to meet the Honolulu team on Christmas day, and the University of Hawaii on New Year's day.

AMERICAN GROUP BACK FROM CUBA; EXPRESS PROTEST

NEW YORK, July 6.—(P)—A delegation of 15 Americans including Playwright Clifford Odets returned today from an unsuccessful "investigating" journey to Cuba with bitter condemnation of Cuban and American officials they charged with covering up disgraceful conditions in the island republic.

The party of would-be investigators was arrested upon arrival in Havana and deported on the S. S. Oriente, which brought them into port this morning.

In a statement they charged that United States embassy officials conspired with Cuban government officials to have them seized and prevent their investigation; that the United States government is influenced by sugar interests and therefore desires to prevent exposure of allegedly bad conditions.

Odets denied that any of the group were communists or that the commission's effort to investigate Cuba was sponsored by communists.

"I am a liberal, not a communist," he said. "This is a non-partisan commission."

Some members, he said, "might be communist sympathizers."

Odets said the group is determined to announce an immediate march of protest against the Cuban consular offices in New York to protest arrest of "about 50 Cuban students and educators" who met the party in Havana. They also said they would, with the aid of "prominent congressmen and senators," immediately organize another and bigger party to inquire into conditions in Cuba on a scale

so large that it could not be stopped. Planned to press for an investigation of "trade unions, negro problems, political imprisonments and civil liberties."

BODY FOUND IN COLUMBIA RIVER

VANCOUVER, Wash., July 6.—(P)—The strangled body of Louis D. Boucher, 45, who disappeared June 18, was found late today in the Columbia river 12 miles below here.

Although the body was somewhat decomposed, Sheriff Leland F. Morrow identified the toothless form by the white, grizzled beard and the thin thatch of hair. A rope was cinched tightly about the neck and the tongue hanging out.

Sheriff Morrow at once took Fred Jones, about 60, and his son Orville Jones, into custody for questioning. They lived on property near the Boucher place which is about eight miles east of here.

Boucher disappeared at night and a purse believed to contain \$30, and his cane also were missing. His every-day clothes, with the exception of his underwear, were found in his cabin.

The body when found was clothed in overalls and a shirt which appeared to have been hastily pulled on and which were not buttoned. Sheriff Morrow said.
