PORTLAND, Ore., July 6.—(AP)—John Law of Berkeley, Cal., shattered Oregon's remaining hope for a home-state tennis champion when he beat Wayne Babu of Portland here today in the state tournament semi-finals.

Victory was in sight for Babu for a time but finally he dropped the fourth set which would have given him victory in the match. He offered little opposition in the deciding set. Scores were 1-6, 6-4, 9-7, 6-1.

The other finalist will be Gene Smith of Berkeley, Cal., whose hand smashes—particularly at the net—were too much for the pre-tournament favorite, John Rietchen, also of Berkeley. Scores were 4-6, 6-3, 6-2, 4-1.

The All-California battle for the Oregon crown will be fought here tomorrow on the Irvington club clay courts.

Oregon's hopes for future domination of its own senior singles were strengthened, however, by the fact that all four junior singles semi-finalists were Portland youths.

The crown went today to Darrell Kelly, versatile strategist, with a 6-0, 3-6, 6-0, 6-4 victory over Hal Murch.

Sabin, half of the defending championship doubles team, paired with Elwood Cook of Portland to defeat Bladen and Nelden of Berkeley, 6-1, 6-4, 2-6, 6-4, going into the finals against the national intercollegiate champions, Newton and Bennett of Berkeley.

Learn to swim! That's one thing that no Eugenean who is unable to propel him (or her) self through the water should overlook this summer. Swimming serves not only as a possible life preserver in times of stress, but also affords excellent exercise, a swell sun-bath, and has numerous other benefits.

Anybody who can't swim will do well to drop up to the Anchorage, where George Wilhelm and Phil Gilstrap are in charge of a swim instruction program. They have taken over the complete line-up for the summer season, and courses in diving and swimming will be featured for several weeks. Both are competent instructors. Wilhelm has participated in many long distance swims, holds several records, and is an expert diver. Gilstrap specializes in high diving and general work along this line, but is also an excellent swim instructor. The classes will be held every morning at 11 o'clock except Saturdays and Sundays. The class instruction is free. A five lesson course of individual instruction is also offered for a small fee.

All strokes will be taught, as well as diving from the three foot board, the 10 foot board and high platform diving.

This is Eugene's only open air public swimming pool, and every Eugene man, woman or child should avail himself of the opportunity to receive valuable instruction. The instructors are competent, the pool is pure and well-filtered, and the Oregon weather is perfect. Don't miss this chance.

Parents may feel perfectly safe to send their youngsters to the classes, for both Wilhelm and Gilstrap are expert lifeguards, and the kids will be entirely protected. Wilhelm, incidentally, is a member of the National Swimming Instructors' association, which is about as high as a swim coach can go.

Now every traveling club in the country, and some eight or ten state universities make that a feature of their ball games.

The pepper game composed of Anderson, Tucker and Tally is second to none, and those that saw the pepper game put on by the Original House of David here June 25, will not be disappointed when they see the pepper game put on by this team.

John Tucker joined the Israelite House of David colony in 1915 and is now the manager. He is perhaps one of the greatest defensive first basemen in organized ball, standing about six feet, four inches tall.

This ball club beat the Townies last year by a small score.

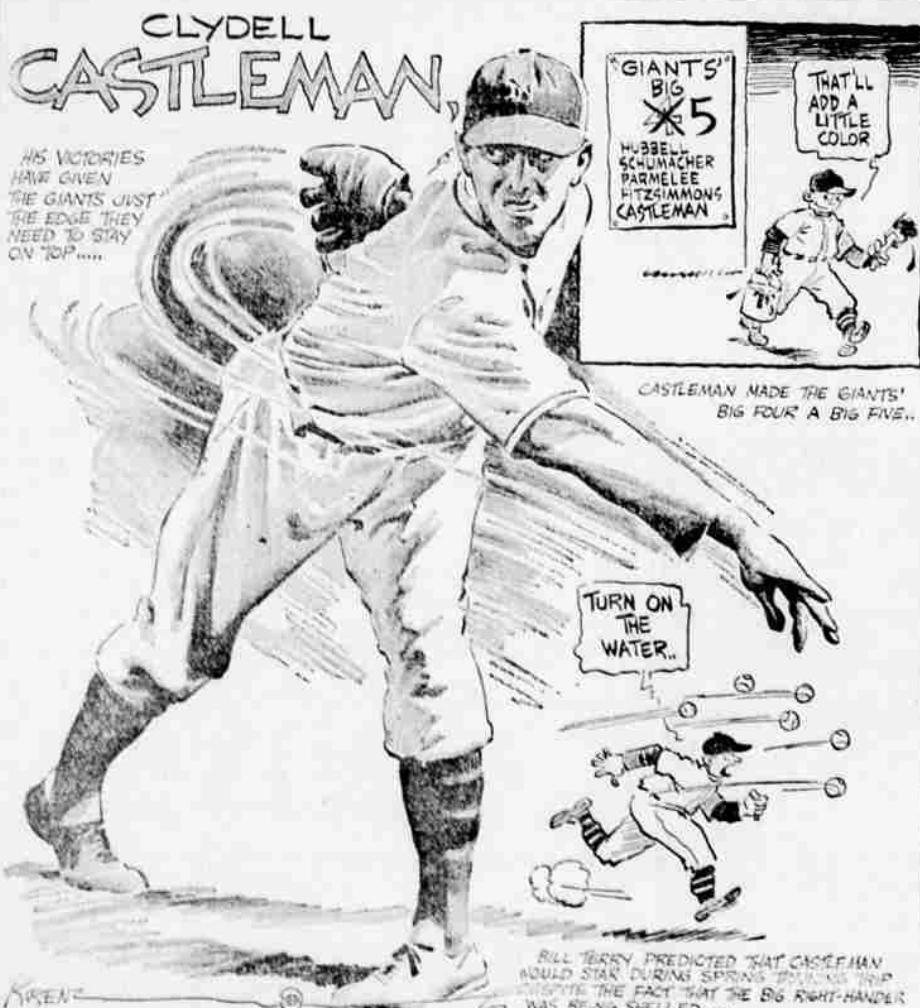
