

GOVERNOR TO SEE THAT NEW CAPITOL FINANCE IS LEGAL

SALEM, July 8.—(AP)—Any plan for financing the state's share of the cost of constructing a new state capitol must be beyond legal question or else be submitted to the people for ratification, Governor Martin said today in commenting upon reports that State Treasurer Rufus Holman would present to the board of control a financing plan based upon an annual rental schedule utilizing available idle state funds.

"I will welcome any legal plan of financing the state's share of the cost of a new capitol building without necessitating the expense of a special election, but any such proposal must be legal beyond question," said Governor Martin.

"If there is any question of the constitutionality of creating such an obligation without a vote of the people I will refuse to do much as give it consideration. If it is necessary to incur an indebtedness of more than \$50,000, the constitutional limitation, in order to complete the capitol building, I will insist that the question be submitted to a vote of the people as provided in the constitution."

"However, in the interests of economy I hope that this expense may be avoided."

Unofficial reports said that Holman had prepared a plan of financing for consideration of the board involving the advance of idle state funds to be repaid out of rentals by the departments occupying the new building, but that the question of legality of the transfer was in question in some instances.

It was pretty well established in state house circles today that the state planning commission and the board of control would favor rebuilding the state house on the old capitol grounds, and that serious consideration of expanding to take in the Willamette University campus has been abandoned. Both boards will meet here Monday.

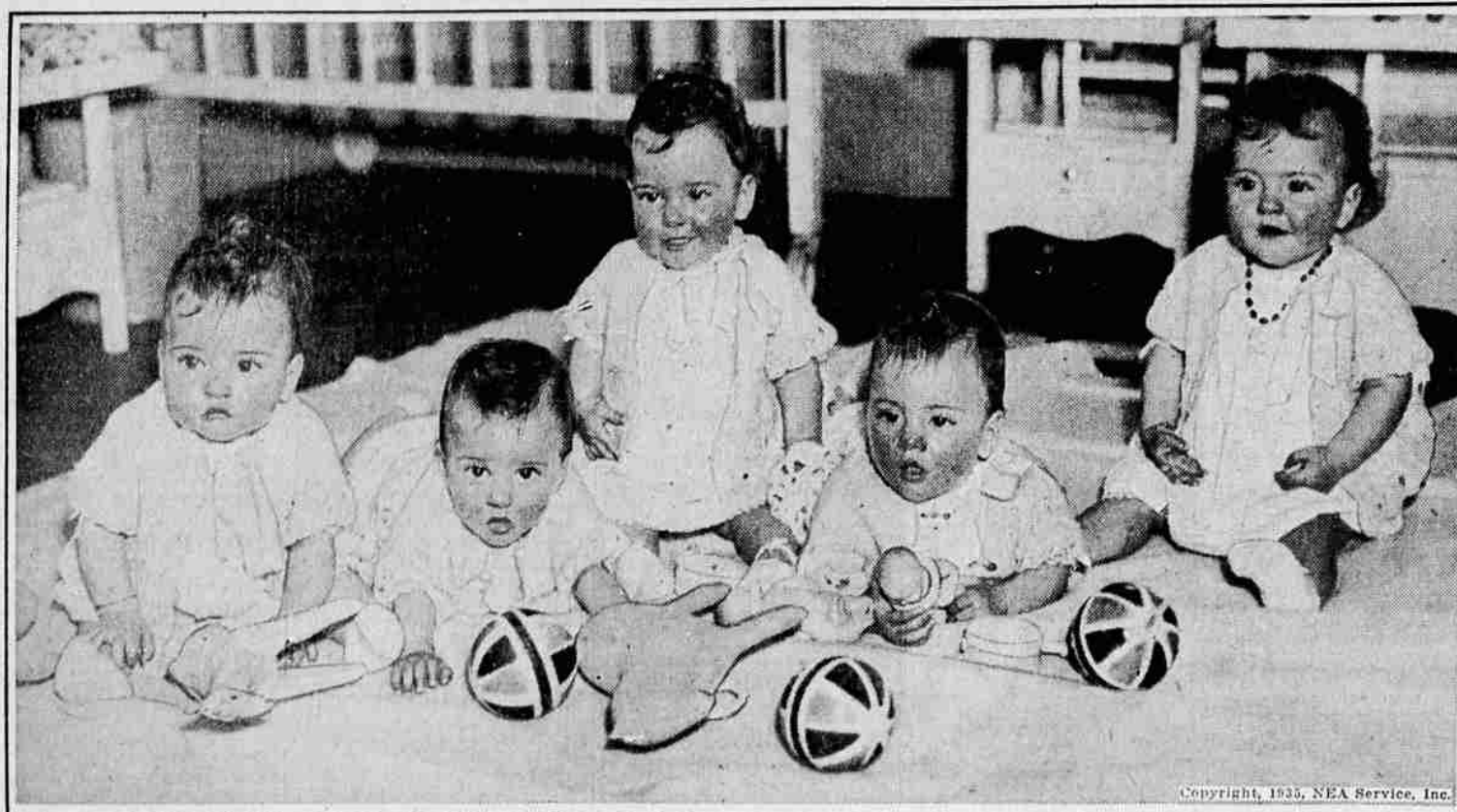

SINCLAIR NOT FOR THIRD PARTY PLAN

PORTLAND, Ore., July 8.—(AP)—Upton Sinclair, sponsor of the "production-for-use" plan which he is taking to Washington for a conference with prominent New Dealers and progressive republicans, was represented today as emphatically opposed to the third party movement announced in Chicago.

Sinclair's manager, Ernest Briggs, quoted the originator of the epic program today as saying his present efforts are confined solely to an attempt to have the "production-for-use" program incorporated in the 1936 democratic platform.

"Only through the democratic plan can such a plan be carried to fruition. I believe an attempt to establish a third party, even when it is based on the 'production-for-use' program, is a step in the wrong direction and I will not support it," Sinclair was quoted as saying.

Briggs said Sinclair, who was a Portland visitor today, is en route to Washington for a conference with leading democrats and republicans July 22 when he will present his plan and seek to have it embodied in the democratic program for next year.

Sinclair, in an interview, also said he would not be a candidate for governor of California again. He was defeated by a comparatively narrow margin by the republican incumbent, Governor Frank Merriam, at the last general election.

Demos, Republicans Disagree On Scope Of Wealth-Tax Plan

WASHINGTON, July 8.—(AP)—Fast-expanding differences over the scope of the president's wealth-tax program prompted opposing redactions tonight that it would be dropped temporarily and that it would hold congress in session well into September.

On one side was Senator McNary of Oregon, republican leader. He forecast that congress would either recess and reconvene in the fall or enact the tax bill at the session beginning next January 3.

On the other side were house ways and means committee democrats, still sticking by their pledge to bring out a bill this session. They doubted, almost to a man, that final congressional action on the bill—not even drafted yet—would be obtained before the first week of September.

Simultaneously, plans went ahead to expedite other measures on a "must" legislative program. The house planned to take up the Tennessee Valley Authority law Monday and vote Tuesday on a motion by Senator DeLoach (D-Ill.) to concure in the house amendments knocking out of the utilities bill a death sentence of "unreasonable" holding companies. Scheduled to follow that were the Wheeler amendment to the AAA amendment and the bus banking bills.

In the house, hearings were held for next week on the new "gold clause bill," while leaders of the Guffey coal stabilization federal alcohol control measure would be ready for the floor by week-end.

President Roosevelt today exerted direct pressure on congress to passage of the Guffey coal stabilization bill, despite any "reasonable" doubt about the constitutionality of the measure.

He expressed that wish in a letter to Chairman Samuel B. Hill (D-Wash.) of the house ways and means sub-committee before which the Guffey bill is pending. The letter written after the president was formed a majority of that sub-committee was against the measure.

"Manifestly, no one is in a position to give assurance that the proposed will withstand constitutional tests, for the simple fact that you get not ten but a thousand different legal opinions."

"But the situation is so urgent that the benefits of the legislation are so great that all doubts should be solved in favor of the bill, leaving the courts, in an orderly fashion, to ultimate question of constitutionality."

"A decision by the supreme court relative to this measure would be as indicating, with increasing clarity, the constitutional limits within which this government must operate."

"I hope your committee will permit doubts as to constitutionality however reasonable, to block the suggested legislation."
