BUTTE FAVORED AS SITE FOR MUSEUM

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relics and books, records, pictures, art objects but space for a sizeable community meeting place or auditorium. From the windows it would be possible to take in views unequalled in Oregon.

"It is my idea," said Mr. Wilkins, "that this museum should be more than just a storage place for county records and relics; it should be a worthy memorial to the pioneer men and women of Oregon, a building which would be as notable in its way as is the Lincoln memorial in Washington."

"For that reason the site is important, and I do not believe you could find a better site than this one on the crest of the butte. The old objection that it is hard to get to has disappeared with the modern automobile and the easy road up the butte. On the butte, the museum would not only be near the center of things but it would attract all visitors to our town."

Tentative Plans Displayed
Mr. Wilkins displayed tentative drawings for the building which were made for him by Architect John Hunsicker. They show a simple structure with wide porches overlooking the valley. Though by no means finished drawings they give a rough idea of what could be done utilizing and improving the old reservoir foundations.

Members of the museum committee were enthusiastic for Mr. Wilkins' idea. Judge E. O. Potter, chairman of the legal committee, said his committee would include problems involved in the reservoir site in their studies of ways and means to set the project up for use of PWA funds. He announced that Lawrence T. Harris and E. O. Immel have agreed to serve with him on this committee.

Cal Young, who heads the committee on estimates and building plans said his group would undertake to get estimates and drawings for the reservoir site as well as for the previously suggested sites in park blocks near the court house. Both committees are to report to a meeting which will be held in the court house Saturday, July 20, at 1:30.

The butte project may involve some changes from the earlier proposals to have the county cooperate on the theory of providing fireproof storage for records which are now being lost or destroyed. Mr. Wilkins said water board and city co-operation could undoubtedly be had for use of the reservoir property, but some special study for the museum committee may be needed to make it possible to get PWA funds.

Even if the county government should be eliminated as a direct contributor to the project out of delinquent tax receipts, due to legal barriers on spending county money anywhere but on county property, the museum would be able to offer ample storage place to the county for its surplus records. With the county eliminated from direct participation, however, it might be necessary to call for public subscriptions to raise a portion of the funds.

Judge Potter said he believed there would be little difficulty in making a legal setup for the museum committee which would make it eligible to federal aid and to the use of either public or private funds. All present expressed the belief that a call for subscriptions would be cordially responded to in all parts of the county.

RELIEF RUSHED

(By the Associated Press)
As the state of New York rushed relief to upstate areas devastated by floods, cloudbursts elsewhere down the Atlantic seaboard increased the menace from high waters.

In New York state, with the death toll at 37, eight persons were still missing. Property damage was estimated at ten million dollars. Although the heavy rains continued the Susquehanna river was receding. But down the Susquehanna, toward Chesapeake bay, tributaries of the river were running over their banks. Cloudbursts in northeast Maryland washed out a section of the Pennsylvania railroad tracks near Havre de Grace, delaying traffic more than an hour. A highway bridge was carried away and more than 300 houses in Havre de Grace and Elkton were flooded.

Storms Bring Havoc

The high waters spread into north-east Philadelphia when Frankford creek swept over its banks. Elsewhere over the world, storm and water brought havoc. In faroff China the Yangtze river swelled to the proportions of a sea, threatening 25,000,000 persons. The 326 miles of land that lay between Hankow and Wuhan was reported submerged. Another few feet of rise, officials said, and 50,000 square miles of China's richest land would be under water.
