### CITY TAX LEVIES ARE ANALYZED BY RESEARCH BUREAU

In medium-sized cities than it is in either large or small. Portland's levy on the basis of 50 per cent of true valuation, is 53.1 mills for all purposes. The median levy in cities over 5000 population is 64.7 mills. In cities of 2500 to 5000 it is 71.2 mills; in cities of 1000 to 2500 population, 72.1 mills; in cities of 500 to 1000 population, 64.5 mills, and in cities under 500 it is 55.9 mills.

Out of 194 cities, 46 were levied upon at rates between 50 and 60 mills; 25 between 40 and 50 mills; 31 between 60 and 70 mills; and 51 between 70 and 80 mills. In 15 cities the levy exceeded 100 mills, while in 20, at the other end, the levy was less than 40 mills.
