

TESTIMONY CLOSES IN WALEY TRIAL; DEFENSE SCORNED

the only witness placed on the stand by the defense.

With a brief government cross-examination of Mrs. Waley finished, John F. Dore, chief defense counsel told the court the defense's testimony was ended.

End Is Surprise

The sudden ending of the testimony by both sides came almost as a complete surprise to the crowded courtroom, although Dore, while Mrs. Waley was being cross-examined, told newsmen that her husband, Harmon Metz Waley, would not be called as a witness.

Speaking slowly, Hughes leaned an elbow on the bar as he reviewed the case, witness by witness.

Most of Hughes' summation was devoted to emphasizing the evidence tending to show Mrs. Waley conspired with her husband and "this bad boy," the fugitive William Dainard.

Hughes said this included Mrs. Waley showing her husband and their fugitive co-defendant William Dainard alias Mahan, a newspaper account of the death of George's grandfather, J. P. Weyerhaeuser, Sr., here May 14; of Waley dyeing his hair red, and of the three leaving Spokane for Seattle to "case the job."

Testimony Emphasized

He emphasized testimony of Ida Hoxworth who had been with the Waleys and Dainard at the Spokane house the three defendants are later alleged to have used as a "hideout house" and of Mrs. Waley leaving two different addresses in the name "Von Metz" one being Waley's mother's home and the other being "general delivery, Butte, Mont." It was at Butte that Dainard disappeared after collecting the ransom, abandoning an automobile and \$15,155 of the ransom money.

Hughes also recalled that Mrs. Waley accompanied Dainard, whom she said she knew as "Davis," on an afternoon automobile ride to Yakima immediately prior to taking George to Spokane. Mrs. Waley testified they went to Yakima only to get dinner.

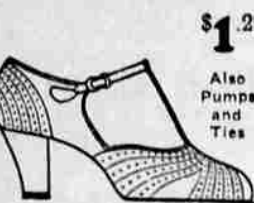

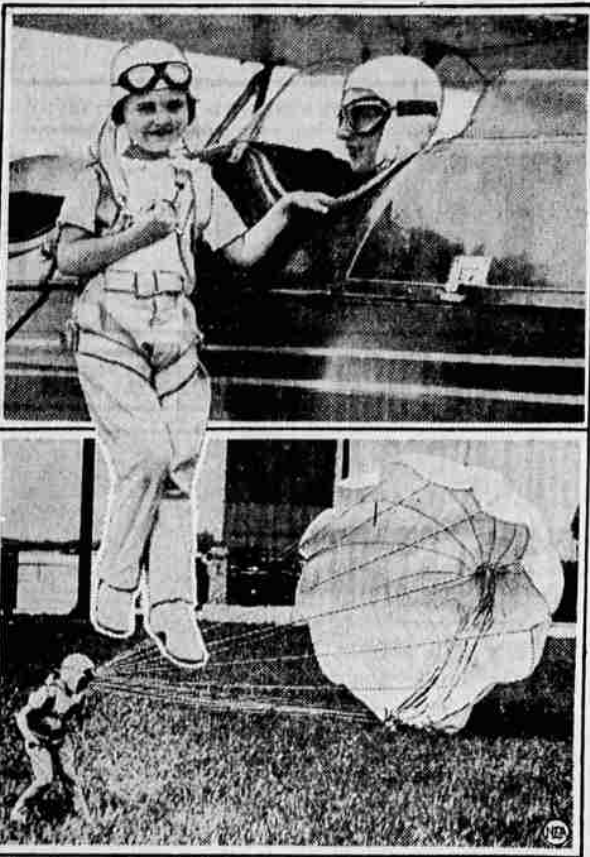

by inch to see where and how the break occurred. Before the collapse the helium was concentrated in the top of the bag which was inflated to only about one-eighth its capacity. This was to allow for expansion in the sun's heat.

The crushing misfortune which so unexpectedly disrupted the expedition climaxed almost a year of preparation. Plans for the attempt were started immediately after the flight last July ended in near disaster over central Nebraska when the bag ripped at a height of 60,000 feet and then exploded.

Was Biggest Balloon

The flight today was to have been the most ambitious undertaking of its kind ever attempted. The balloon, made of approximately 2 2-3 acres of rubberized cotton fabric, was the largest ever built. The nine-foot gondola also was of record size. Captain Anderson was confident the sky craft would break the official record of 11.6 miles, with prospects of reaching a height of 14 miles.

Captain Stevens said he would make an official report to the war department at Washington and Geographic society officials indicated they also would report through their Washington headquarters.

"What stunned us regarding the accident," Capt. Stevens said, "was that everything had gone so smoothly and extra precautions had been taken to make the balloon as strong as possible. Special efforts were made to have the top strong, and it was probably three times as strong as the top in last year's bag."

mission to work with the planning board and the board of control, the "brain trust" told the governor.

A bond issue would be the proper way to finance the capital, but it might be defeated by the voters, the board said. State Treasurer Holman advanced the plan of a direct appropriation by the legislature from the general fund to build the statehouse.

"The state is in the best financial

condition in ten years," the governor said in commenting on Holman's report. The governor was won over from a bond issue scheme by the planners. Purchase of Willamette university campus to add to the old site has not been abandoned, but the state cannot buy the property unless Salem aids financially in erecting the new college buildings, the governor said.

Martin said he had heard the university trustees wanted as high as \$1,500,000 for the campus.

It was thought the capitol might be built on the old location with the possibility of adding to the site in the future.

The state library should be moved from the supreme court building to the capitol, with the library eventually to be housed in a building of its
