

FRESHMAN WEEK AT UNIVERSITY SLATED FOR SEPTEMBER 23

Freshman week at the University of Oregon opens Monday, September 23. Classes begin Monday, September 30. The university staff of professors, instructors and others includes 201 persons. At least 145 hold the rank of assistant professor or above. Doctoral degrees, the highest degree that can be attained, are held by 50 professors. The campus is the home of the Museum of Art, which houses the nationally famous Dr. Warner collection of oriental art.

These facts, and any others that prospective students, parents or others want to know about the University are found in the official catalogue for 1935-36, which is ready for distribution. It is being sent here by George N. Belknap, assistant editor in the division of information.

The catalogue contains a complete list of all courses, departments, schools and colleges of the university, and a list of the faculty members. In many cases students may find in the catalogue the names of the faculty members in the departments in which they are interested.

May 29, classes end. May 30, Memorial day, holiday. May 31, alumni day. May 31, Baccalaureate services. June 1, commencement. June 1-5, final examinations. June 6, Spring term ends.
