Wheat Tumbles As Weather Improves

CHICAGO, July 13.—(P)—Improvement in weather and crop conditions gave wheat prices a decided tumble today.

Death of speculative demand, rather than any unusual pressure to sell, accompanied the action of the wheat market here. A bearish influence in Chicago was a break of 3 cents a bushel for wheat at Kansas City.

Wheat closed nervous, 1 3/4-2 3/8 under yesterday's finish, Sept. 80 1/4, 3/8, corn at 1 cent decline to 1/4 advance, Sept. 74 3/8-8 1/2, oats 3-8 1/2 down, and provisions unchanged to a loss of 10 cents.

RAILS PICK UP; OTHER DIVISIONS ALSO HAVE RISE

NEW YORK, July 13.—(P)—The stock market ended the week today in a fairly active frame of mind.

While there was no buying rush the rails picked up a friendly following and several new highs for the year were registered in other divisions.

The close was steady. Transfers approximated 550,000 shares.

Although Motor and Electrical equipment equities were in demand, price changes, generally, were narrow.

Important stimulus seemed lacking for the list as a whole. The customary week-end evening up operations were in evidence.

The better showing of the carrier stocks was attributed partly to technical influences—they have been backward for some time—and to reports the president would insist on the passage of the Motor Bus and Truck regulation bill at this session.

The utilities were at a standstill as financial observers studied the senate lobby committee disclosure that power interests had thrown a \$300,000 fund against the holding company bill. Financial quarters were cheered by the renewed attack of big business on administration's wealth-tax program.

Another drop in world silver prices did not do silver mining shares any good. Some selling was attributed to fears that the treasury may alter its policy for the extensive purchase of the white metal.

BOSTON WOOL BOSTON, July 13.—(P)—The wool market has recovered moderately from the dullness that set in last week after the holiday, according to today's report of the U. S. agricultural department.

Shies comprised largely the fine and half blood grades, coarser wools having been rather quiet. Price ranges showed no material change, although the maximum prices of the ranges in many cases were difficult to secure as a result of the limited demand.

Strictly combing Ohio and similar fleeces were quoted at 30-31 cents in the grease on 6 1/2 and finer, 58c, 60c, half blood, and 48c, 50c, quarter blood grades, and at 31-32 cents on 46c, three-eighths blood.
