C. D. A. National Convention Is Reported

Mrs. George J. Wilhelm, grand regent for Oregon of the Catholic Daughters of America, has returned to Eugene from attending the national convention of the order in Seattle with interesting reports of the business sessions and attending festivities.

Delegates from 45 states in the United States, Canada, Panama, Mexico, Cuba and Puerto Rico were in attendance at the convention with headquarters at the Olympic hotel at Seattle. Preceding the opening of the convention in Seattle Monday, the delegates were entertained in Portland at the Multnomah hotel after attending mass in a body at the Sanctuary of the Sorrows Mother at which addresses were given by Mayor Carson of Portland, Gerald Mason, grand knight of the Knights of Columbus of Portland, and by Mrs. Wilhelm. Miss Helen McCarty, of Portland sang "For You a Rose" and presented each of the delegates with a rose.

Continuing on to Seattle, the convention opened with a banquet Monday evening, July 1, at which over 800 were in attendance. The governor of Washington, Seattle's mayor and high church dignitaries were present. Tuesday morning, Pontifical mass was held and a sermon preached by Bishop William J. Hasey of North Carolina, who is the national chaplain for the Catholic Daughters of America.

The business session of the convention opened Tuesday and luncheons, receptions and dinners kept the delegates busy. The second day of the convention was "Oregon Day" and at the banquet celebrating it, Mrs. Wilhelm spoke greeting the national officers and Miss McCarty repeated her song, "For You a Rose" and presented each national officer with an Oregon rose.

Concerts, lectures and tours were held in the evenings. One lecture of outstanding interest according to Mrs. Wilhelm was the one given by the dean of the junior university of Mexico City on "Conditions in Mexico With Regards to the Catholic People." Resolutions at the business meetings, according to Mrs. Wilhelm centered birth control measures and in the evening, Father Boyle of the Portland diocese was donated a gift of money to aid in historical data research. There were 100 voting delegates at the convention and over a hundred visitors. The national officers were all reelected, with two new directors being chosen.

Sunday the national officers entertained for Portland and on Monday were guests of honor at a dinner held at the Mallory hotel at which Mrs. Wilhelm was toastmistress.

The report of the convention was given before the meeting of the Eugene Catholic Daughters of America Wednesday evening. At this meeting plans were made for a picnic to be held in August. The committee will be announced later and the date and place for the affair.
