ROAD FUND RULES SENT TO OREGON

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of the project must be not more than \$1,400 per man per year, the regulations under which Oregon's \$5,372,846 of federal work relief money is to be expended differ little from these conditions attached to the spending of other federal relief funds during the past two years.

Wages to Follow Practice

Wage rates are to be fixed by the state highway commission in conformity with standards of the United States bureau of public roads, and must be comparable with the scale paid for purely state jobs.

Except as it conflicts with the requirement that 90 per cent of the labor employed must come from the relief rolls, contractors are free to employ their skilled labor wherever they see fit. The maximum working time for any man shall be 130 hours a month, which applies to all classes of labor.

Not less than 25 per cent of the road fund grant is to be spent outside of cities and municipal areas, not less than 25 per cent within cities and municipal areas, and the balance on federal aid and designated state roads outside of cities and metropolitan areas.

Feeder Roads to Benefit

The only restriction upon the use of the crossing elimination money is that at least 25 per cent shall be spent on "secondary or feeder roads outside of municipalities. These are designated as "roads not on either the federal or highway system or the state highway system," which definition excludes the primary highways in Oregon from the benefits of the money.

There is a modification of the requirement that 25 per cent of the money shall be spent "within municipalities and metropolitan areas" in the definition of what constitutes such an area. Metropolitan areas are defined "as territory immediately contiguous to the relatively larger municipalities * * * within which workers living in the municipalities may be transported daily to and from the work * * *."

Therefore projects immediately adjacent to but not actually within the city limits of the principal cities of the state are eligible for classification as municipal projects. Giving the highway commission more latitude in the selection of projects.

The greatest difficulty foreseen by the highway department in the selection of qualified projects was in that classification designated as "secondary or feeder" roads not on the state or federal aid systems. Here all secondary roads are on the state system, necessitating an expenditure of at least 25 per cent of the road money on county roads.

In that case it was pointed out, the counties must supply the rights-of-way, as the highway commission has no authority to purchase them for any road not on the state system.

SENATORS ALL CRY 'I WANNA GO HOME'

WASHINGTON, July 15.—(AP)—A bipartisan demand that congress stop trying to legislate in sweltering summer heat and go home resounded today in a capital deserted by many new dealers for a pleasure-business week-end.

While President Roosevelt, Vice-President Garner and other democratic chiefs traveled to a road and gun club retreat in the Applegate bay, those who stayed behind fretted and fumed over the prospect of another month or more of bill passing and lobby investigating.

"Every day we stay in session from now on is a tragedy," protested Senator Ashurst, Arizona democrat, as he sat alone reading a newspaper in the empty senate chamber.

"We ought to adjourn and come back in October or December so we can get away from this heat and find out what our constituents want."

Senator Vandenberg, Michigan republican, said "The president should relax and congress should go home."

He added:

"The nation is in the grip of an epidemic of dread. Each citizen is saying to himself 'I wish I knew.' It is time to get off the merry-go-round."

Both houses still have a lot of work to do, both on the floor and in conference committees.

BEND, Ore., July 14.—(AP)—The highest temperature since 1928, when the all time high of 104 was recorded here, was reached Sunday when the mercury climbed to 101. Showers early this morning brought relief and at 8 a. m. a reading of 72 was recorded.

ALBANY, July 15.—(AP)—Rain here early today brought relief from the three day heat wave. Several mild cases of prostration were reported eleven fires started last on medical aid. The peak of the wave was reached late Saturday with 103 degrees. Yesterday's maximum was 100. Precipitation last night was .12 of an inch.

SALEM, July 15.—(AP)—A brief but heavy shower falling here early this morning brought at least temporary relief from the excessive heat of the past two days. The temperature rose to 100 degrees Sunday, slightly less than Saturday's high of 100.8, the hottest day here since July 1927.

KLAMATH FALLS, July 15.—(AP)—A short lived thunder shower brought relief to Klamath Falls Sunday night after the temperature reached 96 for the second straight day. More hot weather was forecast for today.

MEDFORD, Ore., July 15.—(AP)—The mercury soared to 102.2 degrees in this city Sunday, setting a new 1935 heat record. The forest service reported eleven fires started last night in the forests of eastern Jackson county. Rain fell in the Crater Lake national park, and the Prospect districts.

the figure submitted. He says when the fund budgeted for the care of the poor is taken up, the county will draw on state funds and not from the other two funds budgeted by the county.

County court officials said they had received no official word that counties had run short at the end of the first six months, but said they had had reports to that effect. They were puzzled as to how these counties running short could go to the state for relief since they had not budgeted properly and allowed for their needs. Deschutes, Marion and Multnomah were all said to be facing deficit problems with winter coming on.

A meeting of the O. and C. land grant executive committee will be held at 11 a. m. Tuesday in the Lane county courthouse, notification of the meeting being sent Monday to the county court here. Among other matters to come before the group is the selection of a member to take the place of Judge Victor Moses of Benton county who resigned recently when he became the Corvallis postmaster. Reports will be given, too, regarding any new changes in the set-up of the O. and C. land grant, it was reported here.

ROCKS THROWN, SO MILL WON'T OPEN

PORTLAND, Ore., July 15.—(AP)—Indefinite closing of the West Oregon lumber company mill at Linton, where operations were resumed two weeks ago, was ordered by the management today after striking lumber workers had hurled rocks at the residence of a family employed at the plant.

Two large rocks were thrown through a window. One struck the mother of Wesley A. Lindgren, inspector of the mill. Lindgren said he was visited at his home last Sunday by three men who declared they were "not making threats," but that he had "better not go to work or things are liable to happen."

About 50 persons were employed at the mill.

Last night the striking Sawmill and Timber Workers' Union rejected a new offer of employment by the Clark & Wilson, West Oregon and Jones lumber company plants.

A spokesman for the employers said the offer "was final but the union leaders did not allow a fair vote on it."

Frank T. Johnson, secretary of the union, said the offer was rejected "because it didn't offer us a reasonable

proposition such as has been given and approved elsewhere. We have got to have as good a proposition as we have had at other mills where the men have gone back."

Liquor Sales Hit New Low For June

OLYMPIA, July 13.—(AP)—Liquor sales hit a new low for the year during June, totaling \$807,809, the state liquor board reported today. May sales were \$717,000 and April \$1,065,438. The board turned over to State Treasurer Otto Cass \$70,876 as the liquor tax collected during June, representing 10 per cent of the purchase price. The tax included some collections during May late coming in. June liquor sales boosted the total for the first six months of 1935 to \$5,109,176, with a total net profit for the period, \$1,329,391.

TOURIST BUSINESS REGISTERS GAINS

WASHINGTON, July 15.—(AP)—Tourist business gains in many cities and "continued evidences" of retail trade increases were reported by the commerce department today for the week ended July 10.

The survey of 32 cities showed that although there was "some let-down immediately following the July 4 holidays," retail trade "in its entirety indicated favorable aspects, and comparisons with the same week last year were uniformly better."

"An interesting feature," the department said, "in the reports from a number of important cities was to the effect that the current season is witnessing an unusual gain in all types of travel activities."

"In some places, reports were to the effect that the tourist business had reached proportions comparable to those of 1929-1930. These conditions, for example, were reported in New York as prevailing with east-bound trans-Atlantic vacation crossings. Railroads, according to the New York report, are finding this one of the best seasons for tourist traffic in a number of years."

"Local agencies in Chicago reported an increase of 80 per cent in steamship bookings in that area over last year."

"From Seattle it was reported that the influx of tourists had increased from 10 to 43 per cent. The Alaska Steamship company was said to be enjoying the greatest passenger business in its history."
