GRAIN PRICES RISE ON CHICAGO MARKET

CHICAGO, July 17.—(AP)—With black rust reported spreading like wildfire in parts of North Dakota, and Minneapolis prices soaring five cents, Chicago wheat showed notable strength today.

Word of drought havoc in spring wheat throughout important districts was an additional bullish influence. Profit taking sales and holding in Chicago tended, however, to restrict upward here as compared with Minneapolis.

Wheat in Chicago closed nervous, 2 3/8¢ above yesterday's finish, Sept. 85 5-8¢ 7-8, corn unchanged to 1 1/8¢ higher, Sept. 70 3-8¢ 1-2, oats 1-4¢ 1-2 advanced, and provisions showing 5 to 7 cents gain.

Below are more the fruit salad recipes from the last week's contest:

Frozen Kentucky Salad

1/4 cup sugar.
2 tablespoons flour.
1/4 teaspoon salt.
1 egg yolk.
1 1/2 cup lemon juice.
1 1/2 cup pineapple juice.
3-4 cup whipping cream.
1 cup pineapple (sliced).
1 cup white cherries.
3-4 cup blanched almonds.

Method—
Heat lemon and pineapple juice in double boiler. Blend sugar, flour, salt in egg yolk. Add this mixture to the heated juices and cook to the consistency of boiled dressing. Set aside, cool. Whip cream. Fold the cooled cooking ingredients into the whipped cream, lastly fold in the fruit and nuts, both of which have been chopped.

Put into an ice-box tray and freeze. (Freezing time about 3 hrs.) Serve on lettuce with or without mayonnaise dressing. Gwendolyn Brontch 735 High street, Eugene.

Fruit Salad Dressing

This makes a fruit salad much better than a mayonnaise dressing.
1 1/2 cup sugar.
1 tablespoon flour.
2 eggs.
1-3 cup vinegar.
Juice from 1 small can of pineapple.
1 tablespoon butter.

Cook these together in a double boiler and cool before using over the

following combinations: No. 1. Apples, 10 medium sized apples, 1 diced celery, 1-2 cup nut meats, 1 small can sliced pineapple, 8 or 10 apples, 3 bananas, and 3 marshmallows, cut in small pieces. Mrs. A. N. Jones, Seaside.

Lime Fruit Salad

1 package lime jello.
1 pint warm water.
2 teaspoons vinegar.
1-2 cup walnut meats, finely broken.

Dissolve jello in warm water. Pour layer of clear lime vinegar into ring mold, chill until firm. 1-2 of remaining jello mixture, slightly thickened, fold in nuts and chill until firm.

Cover with remaining clear mixture, chill again until firm. Cut on crisp lettuce leaves and serve with mayonnaise. This serves 4 people nicely. Mrs. A. S. Hays 124 E. 13th, Eugene.
