RELIEVED OF OBLIGATIONS

SALEM, July 18.—(AP)—The legislative act whereby nine counties in Oregon were relieved of their obligations to the state for its guarantee of funds obtained from the federal reconstruction finance corporation was declared valid in an opinion by the attorney general today. Counties affected and the sums owed the state were: Baker and Douglas counties, each \$20,833; Klamath county \$86,100; Multnomah county \$725,000; Union county \$18,648; Deschutes county \$20,106; Harney county \$2000; Sherman county \$9070, and Wasco county \$15,000.

REVISION IN SALARIES

SALEM, July 18.—(AP)—Revisions in state employees' salaries to be ready by Aug. 1, will contain many more decreases than increases, Carl Cover, assistant state budget director, announced. Cover has been working on a salary standardization scale since the adjournment of the last legislature. He had virtually completed his list when the capitol burned in April and destroyed his records.
