

DETAILED LIST ON SCHOOL FUND GIVEN BY MOFFITT

Detailed apportionments of the state, county, and elementary school funds to the various districts of the county have been announced from the office of L. C. Moffitt, county school superintendent. The grand total as finally apportioned out was \$33,141.55, divided as follows: State, \$16,648.75; county, \$10,033.20; elementary fund, \$858.60. Mr. and Mrs. John Hansen announce the birth of a daughter, July 8, 1935, at the Corvallis General hospital.

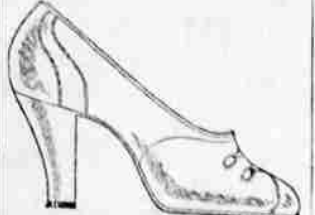

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Stories in STAMPS

HOLY CROWN of THE MAGYARS



MAGYARS, who find themselves separated by new national boundaries from their native land of Hungary, look to the Holy Crown of St. Stephan as a symbol of hope and ultimate reunion. This unique royal headgear really consists of two crowns. The upper part was presented by Pope Sylvester II to St. Stephan, first king of Hungary, in 1000 A. D., in recognition of Stephan's efforts to bring the various tribes that made up the Hungarians under the pale of Christianity.

Later, King Geza I, one of St. Stephan's successors, received the lower part as a separate crown from Michael Dukas, emperor of Byzantium, symbolizing recognition by the east of the cultural efforts of Hungary. Both crowns later were welded into one, a beautiful emblem studded with pearls, rubies and sapphires, and with symbolic paintings surrounding the life of the Magyars.

Today the Hungarians see this crown only in the stamps that they use, as shown here, for the country now is under republican rule.
