# WPA PLANS MADE FOR COUNTY, CITY

project, as well as pushing ahead a project to get the Siuslaw port and a warehouse to be used in connection with more extensive shipping in Lane county's port of Florence.

In the words of some of the county officials Friday, it is not a question of which project to push first, but a question of getting as many projects lined up as quickly as possible and submit them to the WPA as soon as that organization is functioning.

**Fair Board Wants Museum**

The fair board and the county court seem ready to push the fairground or Lane County Community Center project. Some from these sources favor putting the pioneer museum and fairgrounds project together, pointing out that the fairgrounds is the only location for the museum, since the area would be developed to be a county center.

The fairgrounds project has been rushed so far to get it in under the SERA. Now, however, since the SERA is to be shifted with the changes brought about in creation of the WPA, the county court has been advised to put the project under WPA. "That will give us a little more time to work on it and outline it to be a better project," County Judge Fred Fisk said.

There is indication that materials can be obtained from the WPA so there is no reason why these projects ready to go should not be rushed. "This fairground project is going to amount to something. The ground is there, the county owns it. As it is now, the place is a disgrace to the county and something should be done at once," Judge Fisk said.

Robert Callahan, chairman of the fair board, again reiterated his belief that the fairground and pioneer museum project should be pushed together as one, the museum being one of the big features of the new Lane County Community Center.

The pioneer committee is to meet Saturday at 1:30 and some announcement is expected from that source as to what plan the group will follow. It is not certain that this group will favor getting a WPA loan.

garding the necessity of a courthouse addition which would provide for fire-proof quarters for valuable county records. The project as outlined would not exceed \$11,000 cost. It would be a three-story addition, counting the basement, to be erected in the vacant niche at the southeast corner of the present courthouse. These quarters would give ample room for valuable records from the county engineer and surveyor office, from the county assessor office, the county clerk office, and the county treasurer office. "There is no greater need in the county at present than to get these fire-proof rooms for the records running into thousands of dollars," Mr. Dillard said.

In his statement he points out the county is now paying \$420 rent for the offices of the justice of the peace. In an addition there would be room for the justice of peace to have his office at the courthouse, thus saving the county \$420, which would be interest at the present rate warrants bear on \$8,400. Under the government plan, it is possible to receive a 45 per cent grant. "If this grant is secured and the building can be erected for less than \$11,000 the county would be money ahead to build now, rather than pay rent for the justice of the peace," Mr. Dillard said.

Some of the offices, such as the assessor's, the school superintendent, that of the sheriff, and the county surveyor, are noted in Mr. Dillard's statement to show the necessity of protecting valuable records. The figure is given to show county roads cost the county from \$400 to \$800 per miles to survey. If these notes were lost, it would cost the county several times the cost of the fire-proof vaults to replace the records, Mr. Dillard points out.

J. O. Holt, speaking from the county planning committee of which he is chairman spoke specifically of the Long Tom and Muddy Creek drainage projects, and the Florence city water works project.
