Addis Ababa, July 19.—(AP)—Ancient Ethiopia faces a war that will test the courage of its warriors in their fight to preserve their independence. It was in the opening day of war with Italy came nearer, reports of the military unpreparedness of the kingdom.

the country was ready, from the human standpoint, for a fight, and that its men and boys were prepared to give their lives. But the dispatches showed with increasing clarity the formidable nature of the war which confronts them.

Emperor Haile Selassie I will be able to muster perhaps 500,000 men in all. But they are warriors, not soldiers. They are undisciplined, guerrilla fighters, of undoubted bravery but insusceptible to the essential strict discipline of modern war with its requirements for clocklike movement of masses of men under fire.

There are not rifles enough to go around. The United Press Addis Ababa correspondent reported that the regular army even now numbered hardly more than 15,000 men and that it was unlikely to be increased to more than 30,000 within the next few weeks.

Old men and boys in their early teens, all civil servants, everyone who can give battle are training in streets all over Ethiopia.

But of the perhaps 1,000,000 rifles available—some reports say 500,000—not more than 250,000 are believed to be modern repeating rifles. Many of the remainder are one-shot rifles, some antiquated, and needing many types of ammunition—a great disadvantage.

When the tocsin sounds, and the signal fires are lighted for war, rifles all over the country will respond on the minute, in groups of from 50 to 500, under their tribal chiefs.

But in addition to their rifles, the disorganized army will have but about 1,000 machine guns, six little trench mortars, 13 slow commercial airplanes and 200 cannon to augment them, according to an expert estimate today by Jean Perigault, correspondent of the newspaper Matin of Paris.

FISHING IS GOOD ALL OVER STATE; FEW EXCEPTIONS

PORTLAND, Ore., July 19.—(AP)—Fishing conditions continued good over most of the state, the state game commission reported today. Exceptions were Columbia and Yamhill counties where low water spoiled angling.

Trout fishing in the Hood River section was good in lakes and streams with the exception of the middle fork which is milky, due to melting snow. Limit catches of trout and several nice catches of steelhead were reported from the upper west fork and the east fork of Hood River. Favorite flies are the Caddis and Royal Coachman fly, spoon and bait as well as plug fishing was good at Paulina lake. East lake and Elk were fair.

Sparks lake, now accessible, was good until melted snowdrifts muddled it. The Deschutes river has been fair from the lower bridge to the mouth of Crooked river, and the lower Deschutes was fair from south junction to above Mecca. State Police Officer J. C. Miller reported. The Metolius has been fair, with the best catches being taken around the old mill and below. Suttle lake, Square, Jack and Wasco lakes also were fair.

Sea-run cutthroat trout were beginning to come in the Nehalem and the Necanicum rivers, State Police Officer C. P. Smith reported.

Water was low and clear in Goat creek and Klamath river, but fishing has not been good. Fair catches of trout have been made in Big Creek with No. 10 bucktail Coachman flies, and some catches have been made in Bear creek on various flies and single eggs, reported State Police Officer Myron Jones.

Experienced trout fishermen have been keeping the limit on the Rogue river. Diamond lake has yielded fair catches, and stream fishing in the vicinity was good.

Trout angling in Curry county was good. There were many good streams in Lake county, but in Baker county the water was getting rather low.

Carloadings Under Last Year's Marks

WASHINGTON, July 19.—(AP)—The Association of American Railroads today announced that carloadings for the week ended July 13 totaled 568,488 cars, an increase of 94,067 above the preceding week which included the Fourth of July holiday, but a reduction of 37,704 below the corresponding week in 1934.

SOUTHWEST BAKES IN TERRIFIC HEAT; SOME PARTS COOL

SAN FRANCISCO, July 19.—(AP)—The southwest and much of California's great central valley baked again today while other regions of the far west enjoyed cooler weather but hoped for rain that would lessen the forest fire menace.

Calexico, Calif., on the Mexican border, continued in the grip of the heat wave which was blamed for 17 deaths yesterday and Tuesday, as the thermometer rose to 118 degrees, a new high for the year.

Brawley, another southern California "hot spot," was but one degree cooler than yesterday's 1935 high of 118. Temperatures of 100 and higher were general up through the central valley with Fresno reporting 107 at 2:30 p. m.

The coast from San Diego north was generally cool, however.

In the northwest, where record heat shriveled plant life and even killed rabbits and poultry during last week-end, temperatures near the summer normal had returned but continued lack of rain caused concern. Tacoma, Wash., reported only .22 of an inch of precipitation since July 1.

Though only a few small brush fires had broken out, forest service officials said lack of moisture made conditions "bad." These conditions were reported generally in Oregon, Washington, western Montana and northern Idaho.
