LONDON WOOL

LONDON, July 22.—(U. S. Offerings at the wool auction today amounted to 7,320 bales of which 5,853 were sold. In an active market, cross-breeds held at firm limits. The home trade and several continental houses were the chief purchasers. Frequent withdrawals occurred in miscellaneous greasies owing to high limits.

WOOL INACTIVE

BOSTON, July 22.—(U. S. Dept. Agr.)—The finer quality western grown wools were receiving most of the interest here. Medium wools were getting little attention in greasy form lines. Recent sales here included fair quantities of good French combing 64s and finer territory wools at prices around 70 cents scoured basis. Territory wools of 56s, 60s, ½ blood grade had a moderate call at 70-72 cents scoured basis for strictly combing staple and at 60-69 cents for French combing.

PORTLAND BUTTER MARKET IS STEADY

PORTLAND, Ore., July 22.—(U. S. D. A.)—Market for butter continued to reflect a fairly steady tone and without price change generally. Make in general was holding up well.

Local egg market prices are now on a legal basis with quotations on the exchange and on the open market following the official state terms. Grading was reported as unsatisfactory.

There was little change suggested during the week's cheese trade. At home and in the east there was a general feeling of steadiness; weather conditions being in favor of trade volume generally.

Locally the market has held steady for some time past.

While receipts of live chickens were not at all liberal but more or less seasonable in character, demand was being fully taken care of as the volume of the latter has been curtailed recently.

EASTERNERS FEW ON ALL-STAR 11

CHICAGO, July 22.—(U. S. D. A.)—Except for Pittsburgh, eastern football teams will be scarcely represented on the college all-star team which meets the Chicago Bears here August 29.

Voting on the college players closed at 12 o'clock last night and final tabulations are expected to be announced tomorrow.

Three members of Pitt's powerful 1934 team appear to have won a place on the squad. Shovel is running second for center; Weinstock is

In the same position for fullback and Munas is third for quarterback.

The only other eastern players who seem likely to be elected are Borden of Fordham, end; Steen of Syracuse, tackle; Kalbaugh of Princeton, center, and Sheppard of Western Maryland, halfback.

Leaders for every position are from the south, the west or middle west. Don Hutson of Alabama and Frank Larson of Minnesota still are running far ahead for ends. Lee of Alabama and Bengston of Minnesota are ahead for tackle. Monahan of Ohio State and Mucha of Washington are leading the guards. Jack Robinson of Notre Dame is first for center.

Cotton Warburton of Southern California heads the quarterbacks. Stan Kostka of Minnesota is in front for fullback. Purvis, Purdue; Howell, Alabama and Lund, Minnesota, are the first three choices for halfbacks.

VON GRAMM EVENS COUNT WITH U. S.

WIMBLEDON, Eng., July 22.—(U. S. D. A.)—Baron Gottfried Von Cramm scored a three set victory over Wilmer Allison today and enabled Germany to draw level with the United States at one match all in the interzone Davis tennis final. The scores were 8-6, 6-3, 4-4.

Don Budge of Oakland, Cal., gave Uncle Sam a lead in the series Saturday with a four set victory over Heiner Henkel, a team mate of Von Cramm's.

Von Cramm held his own service at love in the sixth game with four thunderous serves and then broke Allison, 4-2, aided by two net-cords as Allison shook his head resignedly.

Cooper Thunders To St. Paul Win 17 Strokes Under

ST. PAUL, Minn., July 22.—(U. S. D. A.)—Harry Cooper has emerged from his private gold mine of golf again with a record strike.

The Chicago star led probably the greatest massed scoring spree in golf history yesterday to win the St. Paul open championship and \$1,200 first prize money with a record 72-hole total of 271 blows. The score smashed par by 17 strokes and the tournament record by seven shots.

His dazzling score, framed by successive rounds of 68-67-68-68 over the Keller course, won him the championship by a four stroke margin over Horton Smith of Chicago and clear domination over the St. Paul show.

In five starts in the tournament, "Light-Horse" Harry has won two firsts, tied for last and another, and won a total of \$6,933.33 in prize money.

YATES WINNER OF WEST GOLF OPEN

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., July 22.—(U. S. D. A.)—Calling himself "dog-gone lucky," Charlie Yates, 21-year-old long hitter from Atlanta, held the Western amateur golf championship today after three years of trying for it.

He shot steadier golf than his opponent, Rodney Bliss of Omaha and formerly of Cornell university, to win the 36-hole title match, 5 and 3, on the peak-hemmed fairways of Broadmoor yesterday.

The win meant not only the silver western cup, but an avenging victory for the blonde-haired youngster from Bobby Jones' home links at East Lake in Atlanta.

In the only other time they clashed in tournament play—the quarter-finals of the Western amateur at Memphis, Tenn., in 1933—Bliss gave Yates a clean beating. Last year Yates was eliminated in the semi-final round.

"At that, Rod's still one up on me," Yates drawled to the gallery massed in front of the clubhouse. "I beat him today only 5 and 3, but he beat me two years ago, 6 and 4."

Eugene Company Gets Big Order

The Eugene Mirror and Glass company has been sublet a contract by the Daily Construction and Engineering company for 5000 sashes, 43,000 lights, three tons of putty, all to be used in the building of the 3-C cabins at the Christensen mill.
