but Mexican Nazi leader, in Tabasco state. Coincidentally he prepared to tell Gov. Rafael Villareal of Tamaulipas state—besieged in his palace by 9000 angry peasants and liberals—to quit or be fired. In his joint action in Tabasco, isolated down on the Gulf of Campeche on the Atlantic coast, and in Tamaulipas, bordering Texas on the Gulf of Mexico, Cardenas showed his confidence in absolute loyalty of the army. Rule of Calles Defied

It was his first dramatic use of the undisputed leadership he won by defeating Gen. Plutarco Elías Calles, the nation's "strong man," and sending him into retirement when he denounced the 40-year-old president's policies as too radical.

Determined that Garrido Canabal's dictatorship should end, he suspended the normal powers of Tabasco state, replaced the governor, and named a new state military commander with orders to see that in approaching state elections there was a fair chance for all.

FOR nearly four centuries people derided the idea that gold could be found in the hills of Quebec, a discovery the great French explorer, Jacques Cartier had made when he landed in North America in 1534. The Indians along the Saguenay river had told him of this precious metal and he jubilantly took some samples of it back to France.

But metallurgists of the day told him this was nothing but iron pyrite, "fool's gold," and that it was worthless. In 1911, however, real gold was found in northwest Quebec and Cartier was vindicated. Now gold mining brings a revenue of \$12,000,000 annually to Quebec, some of the same rock which Cartier took back to France yielding from \$10 to \$12 a ton.

France honors this explorer, however, not for the gold he brought back but for his great land discovery, in stamps issued on the 400th anniversary of his famous voyage.

central division, Rev. Mr. Neat for the Pacific coast division, and the eastern group to be organized later. The Open Bible Evangelistic association was organized three years ago in Des Moines with governing control placed in the hands of a board of seven directors. The organization has a membership of 140 ministers, the headquarters being in Des Moines. The group has many missionaries in foreign countries.

cheese. Add cream, chopped dates and marshmallows which have been cut and mix well. Form into a loaf or long roll and coat with cracker with hot seissors, add half of the nuts. Wrap lightly into wax paper and place in refrigerator for a few hours, preferably over night. Slice and serve on lettuce or water cress as a salad or with crushed fruits as dessert.—Mrs. J. H. Putnam, Springfield.

Lettuce Rolls

1 head lettuce—wash
1 cup cottage cheese
1/2 cup mayonnaise
1/2 cup chopped walnuts
1/2 cup seedless raisins.
Combine cheese, nuts and raisins, add salt to taste. Add mayonnaise and mix thoroughly. Spread on larger leaves of lettuce and roll, fastening with a toothpick if necessary. Makes 12 rolls. This makes a very attractive "party" plate. If one has long stemmed nasturtiums. Tie the rolls with the nasturtium stems, leaving the flowers on top. Put two rolls on each plate with a few of the small lettuce leaves between.—Mrs. A. G. Bouch, 1780 Columbia St., Eugene.

Stuffed Green Pepper Salad

2 large green peppers
2 cups cottage cheese
1/2 teaspoonful salt
1-3 cup mayonnaise
1/2 cupful chopped stuffed olives.
Wash peppers, cut off tops (chop and reserve for use in filling) and remove seeds. Mash cheese to a paste with the mayonnaise. Add olives, chopped green pepper and salt. Fill peppers with this mixture and thoroughly chill. Slice thin with sharp knife and arrange on bed of crisp lettuce leaves. Serve with mayonnaise to which you have added 2 table-spoons Chili sauce. Tempts both the eye and the palate.—Ruth Burkin, 628 Fillmore St., Eugene.

temperature this morning was 57 degrees. At 10 o'clock it had risen to 87, three above yesterday's maximum. Sunday and Monday night's rains still wet the ground.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 24.—(AP)—Washington dispatches today said that this state had received an allotment of \$3,340,000 for reclamation projects. A major portion, it was declared, is to go for the earth dam at the Wickup impounding 60,000 acre feet, in Deschutes county. Cost of this project, with control works, gates and a diversion tunnel, was announced at \$1,000,000. The Oyehoe is to receive \$1,500,000, and the

Burnt river in Baker county \$500,000. The Vale project was allotted \$340,000.

LA GRANDE, Ore., July 23.—(AP)—Despite five-hundredths of an inch of rain that accompanied lightning storms here last night, the heat wave continued today—although not so intense. The maximum yesterday was 91 above and the minimum last night an even 60. Indications were that the mercury would reach the upper 80s today.

ROSEBURG, July 24.—(AP)—Mild temperature under a partly fleecy sky prevails in Roseburg this morning, with indications of dominant sunshine in the afternoon, in repetition of yesterday's local weather. There was no local storm last night.

BAKER, July 24.—(AP)—Fifteen lightning fires were started on the Whitman national forest during an electrical storm Tuesday evening. Men were immediately sent to the scene of the fires and three of the blazes had been extinguished this morning. Rainfall was spotted.

MARSHFIELD, Ore., July 24.—(AP)—The proposal to investigate the feasibility of uniting the incorporated cities of Marshfield and North Bend was greeted here last night with the announcement by members of the North Bend city council that members of that body had voted unanimously against a consolidation.

SALEM, July 24.—(AP)—A large portion of the Umpqua and Coos bay watersheds in Douglas and Coos counties was closed to entry except by permit in a proclamation issued late yesterday by Governor Martin. Lynn F. Cronmiller, state forester, requested the closure order because of existing fire hazards.

BEND, Ore., July 24.—(AP)—Dr. Byron S. White of McMinnville today headed the organization of Chiropractic physicians in Oregon, as a result of the election held at the concluding sessions of the 27th annual convention here yesterday. Dr. August Wehofer, Portland, was named vice-president, and Dr. Nellie Byrd, Portland, was chosen secretary-treasurer.

BEND, Ore., July 24.—(AP)—Crews continued today to repair one of the worst breaks in a central Oregon irrigation lateral in several years. The break in the Tumalo canal of the Deschutes river muddled the stream sufficiently to swell week-end fishing and resulted in farmers receiving but a limited flow of water on their lands from the Columbia southern canal.

THE DALLAS, Ore., July 24.—(AP)—Fire which threatened to destroy the town of Tygh Valley was halted almost at the city limits last night by the combined efforts of Dufur, The Dalles and Tygh Valley fire fighters. Two vacant houses burned.

THE DALLAS, Ore., July 24.—(AP)—A severe thunderstorm accompanied by a brilliant electrical display, broke the heat wave here today. Rain fell in torrents for several minutes. No damage was reported.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 24.—(AP)—The decree of the foreclosure and sale of the properties of the Richfield Oil company, as it affected the firm's property in Oregon, was confirmed here yesterday by Federal Judge John McSwery. The decree was handed down July 3 in Federal court in Southern California.

SALEM, July 24.—(AP)—The city of Salem was held not liable for injuries sustained in an automobile accident of one of its police officials when the latter was driving the mayor of the city to his home, an act declared outside official duties as a police officer, the Oregon supreme

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court ruled today. The case was brought by Minnie D. Kenney against the city and E. C. Charlton, police officer, for \$10,000 damages for alleged injuries sustained when she was struck by the car driven by Charlton. The officer was taking Mayor P. M. Gregory home from a city council meeting.
