

PROBE OF LOBBIES MADE NATION WIDE UNDER NEW ORDERS

WASHINGTON, July 24.—(AP)—The congressional investigation of lobbying spread rapidly today to new ground. The federal communications commission ordered a nation-wide survey of the bombardment of congress with fake telegrams and Sen. Lewis B. Schwellenbach, D., Wash., demanded inquiry into alleged steel company activity against the president's wealth tax program.

Schwellenbach's charge of "palpably false and fraudulent propaganda put out by the steel companies" came near the end of a busy day in which investigators were informed that names signed to telegrams protesting the Wheeler-Rayburn utilities bill came from tombstones, pay rolls and city directories, were not authorized in many cases and were paid for by utilities representatives.

Admits Destroying Documents
Q. C. Haller, utility man, said he destroyed all documents in the campaign in his York, Pa., area on orders from superiors.

In addition, the house lobby investigating committee sent investigators on secret errands in New York, Atlanta and Chicago, and the senate committee discussed extending the inquiry in New York state.

Schwellenbach said he would ask other committees to inquire into "lobbying" activities against the tax legislation as soon as the present investigation of the battle against the Wheeler-Rayburn holding company bill is completed.

Claims Are Disputed
He said stories appearing in this morning's newspaper sought to "carry an impression that taxes take 60 cents out of every steel dollar." Similar statements, he said, were made in a recent publication of the American Iron and Steel Institute.

"That is palpably false and palpably fraudulent," he added.
Robert Lewis, young reporter on the York Dispatch, testified that Haller "burned up" because of a story he wrote for The Philadelphia Record about telegraphic protests sent from York. Haller, he said, complained to the managing editor.

"I interpreted Mr. Haller's appearance as an effort to intimidate me," Lewis said.
